Vienna, April 20.

THE Elector of Bavaria has declared to this Court, that not only his own Troops from Hungary shall perform a Quarantine of six Weeks, within the Frontiers of Bavaria; but that all the Imperial Troops intended to pass through his Country, shall perform a like Quarantine: which is so strictly executed, that a Battalion belonging to Salm's Regiment, which has not so much as been in Hungary at all, is now performing Quarantine in Upper Austria.

Dresden, April 20. M. Keyserling had Yesterday an Audience of the King of Poland, to acquaint his Polish Majesty that General Romanhoff was appointed Ambassadour to Constantinople, to compliment the Grand Signior, in the Czarina's Name, on the Peace lately signed between those two Sovereigns. At the same Time M. Keyserling desired a Passport of his Polish Majesty for the General's safer travelling through Poland. The King of Poland set out Yesterday for Elsterwerda, a small Palace about 30 English Miles from hence, in order to take the Diversion of shooting for seven or eight Days.

And to appoint the Right Honourable the Lord Sidney Beauclerk to be Vice-Chamberlain of His Majesty's Household, in the Room of the Lord Hervey.

The King has been pleased to appoint Horatio Mann, Esq; to be his Majesty's Resident to the Great Duke of Tuscany.

Pistol, before the End of this Week, for their having joined in committing some Persons to Newgate on account of using false Dice: His Majesty, for the better discovering and bringing to Justice the Person or Persons concerned in the writing or sending the abovementioned Letter, is pleased to promise his most gracious Pardon to any one of them, who shall discover his Accomplice or Accomplices, so as he or they may be apprehended and convicted thereof: and also a Reward of One Hundred Pounds to such Person or Persons making such Discovery as aforesaid, payable upon the Conviction of such Offender or Offenders.

Wine Licence Office, April 20, 1740.

All Persons owing, or engaged for Arrears of Rent for Wine Licences, or whose Licences are expired, are hereby required to take Notice, That if they do not pay their said Arrears, and renew their said Licences with all Speed, they will be forthwith prosecuted for the same. And whereas his Majesty's Commissioners for granting Wine Licences have received certain Information of divers Persons presuming to retail Wines without Licence, and to whom Letters have been sent advertising them of the Penalties incurred thereby: These are also to give Notice, that unless such Persons do speedily apply themselves to the said Commissioners, the Laws in such Cases made and provided will be forthwith put in Execution.

Whereas the Post-Boy, who was carrying the Worcester Mail from London to Southall, was set upon this Morning about Four of the Clock, between Audley-street End and Tyburn Turnpike, by Two Footpads, one of which was a lusty Man, in a white Cape Coat, who presented a Pistol to the said Boy, and demanding the Oxford Bag, led him into a Field against Audley-street End, opened the Mail, and took thereout the Worcester and Oxford Bags; the Worcester Bag containing the Ludlow, Tenbury, and Bromyard Letters; the Oxford Bag containing the Burford, Whitney, and Woodstock Letters.

The Postmaster General thinks proper to advertise the Publick, that whoever shall apprehend and convict, or cause to be apprehended and convicted, both or either of the Persons who committed the said Robbery, will be intitled to a Reward of 200 l. besides the Reward given by Act of Parliament for apprehending of Highwaymen. Or if any Person, whether Accomplice in the said Robbery, or knowing thereof, shall make Discovery whereby the Persons, or either of them who committed the same, may be apprehended and brought to Justice, such Discoverer will, upon Conviction of the Party or Parties, be intitled to the same Reward, and also have his Majesty's most gracious Pardon.
