Naples, April 26, N. S. N the 20th Instant the Prince d'Ardore took Poffeffion in Form of the Government of this City, which was lately conferred on him by the King. On the 21st four Gallies, four Row-Boats, and a Barca-Longa, failed out of this Port to cruize against the Corfairs of Barbary. On the 22d an Adjutant with a Party of Soldiers of the Limerick Regiment, went to feveral of the most publick Places of this City, and with the Formalities used here on such Occasions, cited by Beat of Drum the two Captains of that Regiment who lately murdered M. Odea their Colonel, to repair perfonally to their Regi-ment within 40 Days: on Failure of which they will be taken by Force out of the Con-vent of Monte Calvario, the Place of their Reference of their Refuge, and punifhed according to their Crimes. Sig. Charny, Captain General of the King's Forces, is dangeroufly ill of a Dropfy. On the 24th an Extraordinary Courier arrived here from Spain, and among other Difpatches, brought the King of Spain's Or-ders to Sig. Fuenclara, his Ambailadour at this Court, to fet out speedily for Madrid.

Rome, May 1. On the 24th pail the Duke of St. Aignan, attended by many Prelates and other Perfons of Diffinction, pre-fented his Credentials as Amballador Extra-ordinary from the King of France, to the Chiefs of the Orders at the Gates of the Conclave, with the usual publick Formalities. To Day Prince Craon received the Order of the Golden Fleece from the Hands of Prince Santa-Croce; on which Occasion the latter gave an Entertainment of Mulick and a Ball, to which reforted a great Number of the Roman, French and German Nobility.

Whitehall, May 19.

His Majefty's Sloop the Swift, commanded by Captain Michell, arrived at Plymouth on the 12th Inftant; from whence the Captain writes, that he came from Oporto the 29th past, where he learnt that Nine Spanish Men of War and Three Frigates from Cadiz arrived the 16th of April at Ferrol, where were Nine more Spanish Men of War: That on the 2d Instant he met Vice-Admiral Balchen about 16 Leagues from Cape Finisferre, to whom he gave an Account of the faid 18 Spanish Men of War and three Frigates be-ing in the Harbour of Ferrol. The Vice-Admiral having kept him a few Hours, fent Letters by him, adviling, that upon this In-telligence he proposed to keep cruizing be-tween Cape Finisterre and Ushant with the Squadron of his Majefty's Ships under his Command, confifting of the Ruffel, Norfolk, Grafton, Dunkirk, Deptford, and Severn.
