Their Excellencies the Lords Justices in Council.

His Majesty having been pleased by Letters Patent under the Great Seal of Great Britain, to constitute the Right Honourable Charles Lord Cornwallis, Constable of his Majesty's Tower of London, and also Lord Lieutenant of the Tower Hamlets: His Lordship this Day in Council took the Oaths appointed to be taken instead of the Oaths of Allegiance and Supremacy, as Constable of the said Tower, and as Lord Lieutenant of the said Tower-Hamlets, and likewise the Oath of Constable of the Tower of London.

Petersbourg, June 10. The Honourable Edward Finch, Esq; his Britannick Majesty's Minister Plenipotentiary to this Court, had his Audience of her Czarish Majesty on the 8th Instant. The Czarina sent one of her own Coaches and Six, an Equerry, four Grooms on Horseback, two on Foot, and two Footmen, to conduct Mr. Finch to Court, where he was received at the Coach Door by a Gentleman of the Court, the Guards resting on their Arms, and conducted by him thro' the Garden to the Czarina's Apartment, at the first Door of which the Marshal of the Court and two Chamberlains received and conducted him to the Anti-Chamber, where the Grand Marshal Count Lewenwolde made him a Compliment from the Czarina; after which Mr. Finch was introduced by the Grand Marshal to her Czarish Majesty, who was seated on a Throne, the Duke of Courland as Grand Chamberlain on the Right Hand, and the Prince of Hesse Homburg on the Left, the Ladies of the Court, all the Generals, &c. being also present. Mr. Finch having made his Compliments to the Czarina, was conducted to an Audience of Princess Anne and the Princess Elizabeth, and having paid his Compliments to them, as he also did to the Prince of Brunswick, he was reconducted home in the Czarina's Coach. In the Afternoon of the same Day, he had also his Audiences of the Dutchess of Courland and the young Princess, the Hereditary Prince dining abroad at his Uncles with the Turkish Seraskier and Aga, who are returning home. To these Audiences Mr. Finch was conducted in the Duke of Courland's Coach with a Pair of Horses, attended by two Grooms and two Footmen. At Night there was a Drawing Room at Court, where Mr. Finch had the Honour to play at Cards with the Princess Anne, another Lady, and General Botta, who made up the Party. General Keith arrived here last Night, and went to make his

Court this Morning to her Czarish Majesty, who received him very graciously, and made him a Present of a Sword, the Hilt of which was set with Diamonds, and a Gold Medal.
