Leghorne, July 1. N the 26th past sailed from this Port his Britannick Majesty's Ships the Argyle, Capt. Lingen, and Ken-nington, Capt Robinson, with a Convoy of twenty Merchant-men, bound for England: They are to call at Genoa to take up luch British Merchant Ships as are bound for the Streights and the Coast of England. One of the English Transports remains in this Port to take in about 2000 Cantals of Biscuit, whi h is baking here for the Fleet.

Between Twelve and One his Majesty returned in a Chaise to Herenhausen. His Majesty was faluted by the Artillery both at his coming and going. This Asternoon his Highness Prince William of Hesse arrived here, and waited on his Majesty at Herenhausen. His Highness is to lodge at a House which is by the King's Order always in a Readinels for the Reception of Foreign Princes, and is to be attended by the Officers and Servants of his Majesty's Houshold.

Sir Chaloner Ogle arrived here this Afternoon from Gibraltar, with nine of his Maje-fly's Ships under his Command, viz. The Augusta, Elizabeth, Lyon, Prince of Orange, Superbe, Litchfield, Jersey, Assistance, and Falkland.
