Copenhagen, July 22.

THE Queen of Denmark since her Return hither, has made a Present to the Prince of Wirtemberg-Oels of a very fine Snuff-box set with Diamonds. The Sleswick, a Ship belonging to the Danish East India Company, arrived here on the 15th from China: She left Canton on the 7th of January, and touched at St. Helena. Yesterday M. Cogorani the Spanish Envoy had his first Audience of their Danish Majesties at Fridericksbourg; to which Place the Court removed on the 19th Instant for the Remainder of the Summer.

Hambourg, July 27. M. Berkentin, who has resided for many Years at the Imperial Court as Envoy Extraordinary from the King of Denmark, arrived here last Saturday from Vienna, and set out Yesterday for Copenhagen.

Hanover, Aug. 5, N. S. His Majesty has been pleased to appoint Melchior Guy Dickens, Esq; late his Secretary to the Court of Berlin, and who came hither some time ago to pay his Duty to the King, to be his Majesty's Minister at the said Court, and Yesterday he kiss'd his Majesty's Hand; and having had his Audience of Leave of the King, set out this Evening on his Return to Berlin. The King has been pleased to grant the Place and Dignity of Dean of the Cathedral Church of Peterborough, void by the Death of Dr. Francis Lockier late Dean thereof, unto the Reverend Dr. John Thomas, one of his Majesty's Chaplains in Ordinary, and now attending his Majesty here.

From on board the Boyne in Torbay, July 26. The Fleet commanded by Sir John Norris, with 100 Sail of Merchant Ships, not being able to get out of the Channel, bore up for Torbay, and are come to an Anchor, but will put to Sea again with the first Opportunity.
