Madrid, June 6.

That the *Genouefe* Convoy, eight Ships, arrived there the same day, bound for *Cadix*, to glean up the remainder of what the Galleons brought, though they were in no small apprehension that Monsieur d' *Almeraz* would shew them no good countenance, should he fortune to meet them at Sea.

Madrid, June 21. The Marquess de *Aseual*, a Portuguese, and late Governor of *Centa*, hath had the Commission to be *Maeßro de Campo* General in *Flanders*, sent him to *Catalonia* (where he served with the same Title) and Orders to pass with all convenient speed towards the execution of his charge. The last week died in this Court, the Marquess de *la Fuedes*, a Principal Minister here, of the Council of State, and famous in many forreign Embassies. We hear from *Tangier*, That the benefits of the Peace do every day more discover themselves. That the Wars of the Countrey have reduced *Sally* to a very poor condition, such as may give *Guyland* a speedy opportunity of obliging them to submit to him, in which case he would be able to open a Trade between them and *Tangier* by Land, as now he does with *Tetuan*, from whence ordinarily arrive three score Horses and Mules in a day, laden with the Commodities of the Countrey.

Cadix, June 29. They confirm the taking of the *Venezian* Ship by the *Algerines*, which had near 300 Spanish Souldiers on board, and carried the value of 300 thousand pieces of Eight; That the same Moors had likewise lately taken a *Majorca* Frigate of 26 Guns, and 150 Men, the Fight continuing from four in the Morning, till 12 at noon, the Captain (who was a Knight of *Maltha*) and 50 of his Men being killed. The *Algerines* Celebrated the bringing in these Prizes, with Bonfires, and other testimonies of rejoycing. That the *Ostend* Convoy, with 600 Spanish Souldiers, several *Hamburgers* and *Dines* in their Company, in all 14 Sails, sayled out of that Bay on the 23, and that a Dutch Ship was come in there, laden with Blacks from *Guiney*. From the same place the 4th instant, That two days before arrived in that Bay, an *Ostend* Convoy, with several Merchant men in 12 days from home.

Legorne, June 12. The 10 instant failed hence the two French men of War, who have Letters of Reprifal against the Subjects of the State of *Genoua*. A Felucca arrived here yesterday, brings advice, that he met near the *Streights Mouth*, two *Algier* Galleys and a Galliot. Orders are come this day from *Florence*, for the fitting out three Galleys with all the speed that may, who are to go and cruise, and secure our Coasts from these Pyrats; an Embargo is laid upon all Ships, till these Galleys shall be ready to sayl. Here are raising 1500 Men, for the Service of the most Christian King, part of which have been already sent from hence to *Marseilles*.

Vienna, June 18. The Emperor is returned from *Luxemburgh* to his usual Residence in this place; The Comedies and other publick Divertissements; which were forbid upon the death of the Empress, are now permitted again; the generall discourse being, that we shall very suddainly see the Emperor Married to the Arch-Duchess of *Auspucke*. Sir *Bernard Gifcoign*

who hath some time resided here, on the part of His Majesty of *Great Brittain*, is preparing for his return home. All the Officers of the Army are fitting themselves, in order to their departure to the Camp at *Egra*, from whence it is said, the Army will begin to march, towards the latter end of this Month. The Count *Hohenloo*, and the Heer *Steyn*, Députed by the States of *Franconia*, to bear their excuse to his Imperial Majesty, for that they cannot permit his Troops to Quarter in their Countrey, in their intended march towards the *Rhyn*, having performed their Commission, are returning home again: In *Hungary* things seem to continue much in one posture, the Rebels, notwithstanding all the endeavors that have been used to quell them, making still head in several Parts of that Kingdom, which makes it thought, however we are assured to the contrary, that the Turkish Bassas on the Frontier, assist them under hand; The Imperial Troops have of late defeated several Parties of them, and taken some Prisoners, though this has not been able to discourage the rest in their ill designs.

Hambrogh, June 23. After the many uncertain reports we had, concerning General *Wrangels* coming over from *Sweden*, the day for his departure from *Stockholme*, is now fixed to be the 11 of the next Month; He will bring several Troops with him, and together with those that Crown has at present in their service, on this side, he will form a Body of 16000 Men; The design of that Crown, in bringing these Troops together, is variously reported; In the mean time, they of *Bremen* are not without jealousy, and accordingly have sent to their Neighbors, to desire their assistance, in case they should be Attacked, and besides, use all imaginable endeavors to put themselves into a good posture of defence.

Cologne June 30. On Tuesday last returned hither from the Camp before *Maeßtricht* a Gentleman, whom Count *Tot*, one of the Swedish Mediators, had sent thither, and this Morning we are assured, his Excellency intends to go himself, to wait upon his most Christian Majesty there, concerning some matters relating to the Treaty; The Envoyes Extraordinary of the Crown of *Spain*, were yesterday to visit the Dutch Ambassadors, and several Conferences are held between them. The 28 instant was held the first Conference for the Treaty of Peace, in the Convent of the *Carmelites*, which lasted three hours, the Mediators were present there, and the Ambassadors met in distinct Rooms, so that the Mediators Treated with them separately. We have advice, that the Sieur *Rabenhaup*, Governor of *Gronningen*, hath taken the Fort called *Langacherseins*, which he hath Besieged some time.

Heideburgh, June 24. The eighteenth arrived here the Sieur *Bruneau*, being sent by the Duke and Dutches of *Orleans*, to acquaint our Elector with the good news of her Royall Highness being brought to Bed of a young Prince, who is called the *Duc de Vilois*. The same day this Gentleman parted from hence to *Manberm*, our Elector having his Residence at present at *Fredericksburgh*, where he hath been very nobly received, and dismist with a rich Present, and is now on his return again.
