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From Thursday June 26. to Monday June 30. 1673,

Malaga, June 6.

Hat the Genouese Convoy, eight Ships, arrived there the same day, bound for Cadiq, to glean up the remainder of what the Galleons brought, though they were in no small apprehension that Monsieur d'Almeras would shew them no good countenance, should be fortune to most them at Sea.

Midrid, June 21. The Marquels de Afeutal, a Portuguese, and late Governor of Ceuta, hath had the Commission to be Maestro de Campo General in Flans ders, fent him to Catalonia (where he ferved with the fame Titley and Orders to pass with all convenient speed towards the execution of his charge. The last week died in this Court, the Marquels de la Fuentes, à Principal Minister here, of the Council of States and famous in many forreign Embassies. We hear from Tungien, That the benefits of the Peace do every day more discover themselves. That the Wars of the Countrey have reduced Sally to a very poor condition, such as may give Guyland a speedy opportunity of obliging them to fubmit to him, in which case he would be able to open a Trade between them and Tangier by Land, 'as now he does with Tetuan, from whence ordinarily arrive threescore Horses and Mules in a day, laden with the Commodities of the Countrey.

Cadiz, June 29. They confirm the taking of the Venerian Ship by the Algerines, which had near 300 Spanish Souldiers on board, and carried the value of 300 thousand pieces of Eight; That the same Moors had likewise lately taken a Majorca Frigat of 26 Guns, and 150 Men, the Fight continuing from four in the Morning, till 12 at noon, the Captain (who was a Knight of Mattha) and 50 of his Men being killed. The Algerines Celebrated the bringing in these Prizes, with Bontires, and other testimonies of rejoycing. That the Ostend Convoy, with 600 Spanish Souldiers, several Hamburgers and Dines in their Company, in all 14 Sayl, sayled out of that Bay on the 23, and that a Dutch Ship was come in there, laden with Blacks from Guiney. From the same place the 4 instant, That two days before arrived in that Bay, an Ostend Convoy, with several Merchant men in 12 days from home.

Legorne, June 12. The 10 instant sailed hence the two French men of War, who have Letters of Reprisal against the Subjects of the State of Genous. A Felucea arrived here yesterday, brings advice, that he met near the Streights Mouth, two Algier Galleys and a Galliot. Orders are come this day from Florence, for the fitting out three Galleys with all the speed that may, who are to go and cruise, and scure our Cousts from these Pyrats; an Embargo is said upon all Ships, till these Galleys shall be ready to sayl. Here are raising 1500 Men, for the Service of the most Christian King, part of which have been already sent from hence to Marseilles.

Vienna, June 18. The Emperor is returned from Laxemburgh to his usual Residence in this place; The Comedies and other publick Divertisements; which were sorbid upon the death of the Empress, are now permitted again; the general discourse being, that we shall very suddainly see the Emperor Married to the Arch-Dutches of Inforucke. Sir Bernard Giscoign,

who hath some time resided here, on the part of His Majesty of Great Brittaine, is preparing for his return home. All the Officers of the Army are fitting themselves, in order to their departure to the Camp at Egra, from whence it is faid, the Atmy will begin to march, towards the latter end of this Month. The Count Hos henloo, and the Heer Steyn, Deputed by the States of Franconia, to bear their excuse to his Imperial Majelly, for that they cannot permit his Troops to Quarter in their Conntrey, in their intended march towards the Rhyn, having performed their Com nission, are requireing home again: In Hungary things seem to continue much in one posture, the Rebels, notwithstanding all the endeavors that have been used to quell them, making still head in several Parts of that Kingdom, which makes it thought, however we are affured to the contrary, that the Turkish Bassa's on the Frontier, assist them under hand; The Imperial Troops have of late defeated several Parties of them, and taken some Prisoners, though this has not been able to discourage the rest in their ill designes.

Hambro 1gh, June 23. After the many uncertain reports we had, concerning General Wrangels comeing over from Smeden, the day for his departure from Stockholme, is now fixed to be the 11 of the next Month; He will bring feveral Troops with him, and together with those that Crown has at present in their service, on this side, he will form a Body of 16000 Men; The design of that Crown, in bringing these Troops together, is variously reported; In the mean time, they of Brewen are not without reasons, and accordingly have sent to their Neighbors, to desire their assistance, in case they should be Attacked, and besides, use all imaginable endeavors to put themselves into a good possure of desence.

Cologne fune 30. On Tuesday last returned hither from the Camp before Maestricht a Gentleman, whom Count Tot, one of the Swedish Mediators, had sent thither, and this Morning we are affured, his Excellency intends to go himfelf, to wait upon his most Christian Majesty there, concerning some matters relating to the Treaty; The Envoyes Extraordinary of the Crown of Spaine, were yelferday to visit the Dutch Ambassadors, and feveral Conferences are held between them. The 28 instant was held the first Conserence for the Treaty of Peace, in the Convent of the Garmelites, which latted three hours, the Mediators were present there, and the Ambassadors met in distinct Rooms, so that the Mediators Treated with them separately. We have advice, that the Sieur Rabenhaup, Governor of Groningen, hath taken the Fort called Langacherfoins, which he hath Besieged some time.

Heidelburgh, June 24. The eighteenth arrived here the Sieur Bruneau, being sent by the Duke and Dutchess of Orleans, to acquaint our Elector with the good news of her Royal Highness being brought to Bed of a young Prince, who is called the Duc de Vilois. The same day this Gensleman parted from hence to Manherm, our Elector having his Residence at present at Fredericksburgh, where he hath been very nobly received, and disnish with a rich Piesent, and is now on his return again. Amidst all the discourse of the Milkary preparations, which the Emperor and some other
