Backhoff, the Danish Relident, had on the 3d Instant an Au-dience of the Czarina as Envoy Extraordinary ; as had alfo the fame Afternoon an Envoy from Chiva, which is a Diffict of Tartary lying between the Calpian Sea and the Lake of Arol: and an Envoy from the Tartars of Bucharia, is just arrived here. The Velt Marshal Munich, with the Hereditary Prince of Courland, fet out Yesterday Morning for Wyburgh to view the Fortifications there. M. Podoski, who came hither fome time ago, to follicit this Court to indemnify the Damages the Czartowriski Family, particularly the Palatin of Ruffia, had fuftained by the March of the Muf-covite Troops through Poland, fet out from hence last Week, after having obtained thirty thousand Rubles on that Account.

Stockholm, Aug. 15. The Universalia for fummoning an extraordinary Allembly of the States of this Kingdom, for a Diet to be held here on the 4th of December next, are prepared, and will be published To-morrow, at which Time it is expected the Court will be in Town. General Diemar fet out from hence on Saturday last in his Way to Hanover. Count Cronstedt, who now commands in Finland, is made Prelident of the College of War; Count Lewenhaupt, General of the Horfe; M. During, Lieutenant General; M. Zulick, General of Foot, and M. Budden-broke, Lieutenant General; and it is expect ed Count Lewenhaupt will be fent to com-mand in Finland in the room of Count Cronftedt.

Copenhagen, Aug. 20, N.S. A Veffel of 50 Guns was launched here Yefterday; and three more, the first of 70, the second of 50, and the third of 40 Guns, will forthwith be put upon the Stocks.

Whereason Friday the 15th Inflant, Mr. George Worge, of Battell, in Suffex, received a threatning Letter, re-quiring him to lay Five Guineas in the Porch of the faid Parifo Church, otherwife his dwelling Houfe, fituate

in the faid Parth of Battell, fould be fet on Fire; and accordingly on the Sunday fallowing, about half an Hour after Ten 2t Night, there came Two Men with an In-tention, as there is Reason to believe, either to rob or burn the said Mr. Worge's House, but the Guard that he bad placed there, firing upon them, they were obliged to retire. In order to discover the Person or Persons concerned in writing or fending the faid Letter, or in making an Attempt upon the said House, their Excellencies the Lords Justices are pleased to promise His Majely's most gracious Pardon to any one of ibem who fhall difewer bis Accomplice or Accomplices, fo as he or they may be apprehended and convicted thereof.
