Rome, August 27.

N the 16th in the Afternoon, Cardinal Lambertini was proposed for Pope, and immediately elected by a great Majority. On the 17th in the Morning his Election was declared to the Publick by Cardinal Marini from the Balcony of the Vatican, which met with a general Satisfaction and Applause of the People; on which Occasion the Guns of the Castle St. Angelo were fired. The same Day the 17th, Cardinal Corsini entertained the new Pope at a splendid and magnificent Dinner, in his Apartment in the Conclave. In the Asternoon the new Pope, dressed in his pontifical Robes went to St. Peter's, accompanied with continual Acclamations from the People, where he received for a third Time the Adoration from the Cardinals, and on his Return to his Apartment was complimented by the Foreign Ministers, Prelates and Nobility. 18th the Pope appointed Cardinal Valenti Gonzaga Secretary of State, Cardinal Aldrovandi Datary, Advocate Giustiniani under Datary, Sig. Carbognano Great Chamberlain, Sig. Perelli President of the Markets, M. Laurani Secretary, of the Margarials, Abbor Leuizani Secretary of the Memorials, Abbot Costanzo Secretary of the Cypher; and confirmed the Dukes Corsini and Strozzi in their Posts of Captains of the Light Horse: He also appointed several Chamberlains and Chaplains, and Cardinal Ruffo Vice Chandle Chaptains and Cardinal Ruffo Vice Chandle Chaptains. cellor, who has contented himself with this Post without the great Incomes, and only the Palace. The Pope has restored Cardinal Coscia. On the 21st the Pope was crowned with the usual Ceremonies.

His Majesty having been graciously pleased, by his Warrant under his Royal Sign Manual, dated the 10th of June, 1733, to establish certain Rules and Orders for the better Government of the Charity for the Relief of poor Widows of Commission and Warrant Officers of the Royal Navy: These are to give Notice to all such Widows whose Husbands died on or since the 30th of August 1732, that Copies of the said Rules and Orders are lodged with the Commissioners of his Majesty's Navy at Chatham, Portsmouth, and Plymouth; as also with the Clerks of the Cheque at Deptsord, Woodwich, and Sheer-Clerks of the Cheque at Deptford, Woolwich, and Sheer-ness; and with the Naval Officers at Harwich, Deal, and Kinsale; where they may be informed of all Particulars which entitle them to the Benefit of the faid Chasity, and receive the proper Certificates for that Purpole. But such Widows as live at too great a Distance

from the Places above-mentioned, may apply by Letter to Thomas Corbett, Elq; at the Admiralty Office, who will fend them all necessary Insormation. And the Governors of the said Charity intending to distribute to the Widows of such Sea Officers who died before the 30th of August 1732, and whose Circumstates mean thin the Rules of the Establishment, their Share of the Bounty granted by Parliament; these are to give Notice of the same to all fuch Widows, that they may pocure the proper Cer-tificates and Affidavits, and fend or bring them hither. And the Court of Assistants do hereby give Notice, that they will meet at this Office on Tuesday the 16th of September next, at Eight o'Clock in the Morning, to receive the Claims of such Widows as shall be qualified according to the said Rules and Orders.

The Rt.
