Petersbourg, August 19, O. S.

ON the 12th Instant in the Afternoon, the Princess Anne, Dutchess of Brunswick-Lunebourg, her Czarish Majesty's Niece, was happily delivered of a Prince. On the 18th the young Prince was christened privately, that is, Persons only of a certain Rank were admitted into her Czarish Majesty's Dressing Room, where the Ceremony was performed. The Czarina named him Iwan, that is, John, and was his Godmother. Upon this Occasion several Officers of the Guards were advanced to a superior Rank; and M. Bestuchef, who lately came from Denmark, was declared Cabinet-Minister. The Day before, which was Sunday the 17th, and the Prince of Brunswick's Birth-day, Te Deum was sung in the Church of the Citadel for the Birth of the young Prince, and the Cannon of the Forts were fired; and the young Prince is ordered to be prayed for in all the Churches. The Court, after having quitted the Mourning for the Death of the King of Prussia for six Days, on the Birth of the Prince, resumed it again this Morning.

Copenhagen, Sept. 10, N. S. General Niemar, who arrived here lately from Stockholm, went last Tuesday the 6th Instant to Fridericksbourg, and had the Honour to dine with their Danish Majesties, and to be received by them in the most gracious Manner: On Thursday the 8th he went thither again, and thence to Roschild, intending to make another Halt at Gottorp, in order to pay his Court to the Margrave. Last Week died suddenly, pretty far advanced in Years, Count Sponeck, General of the Infantry, and Commandant of Copenhagen.

Dresfen, Sept. 11, N. S. On the 7th Instant the Royal and Electoral Prince arrived here, and by the King's Appointment made a splendid Entry. On the 8th the Foreign Ministers complimented his Royal Highness on his Arrival. M. d'Utterodt, his Polish Majesty's Envoy Extraordinary to the Court of Great Britain, arrived here from Hanover on the 8th Instant, and will continue here till their Polish Majesties set out for Warsaw; when he will go to his own Estate, having obtained Leave for that Purpose, and intends to return to his Post in England about the latter End of October.

His Majesty having been graciously pleased, by his Warrant under his Royal Sign Manual, dated the 10th of June, 1733, to establish certain Rules and Orders for the better Government of the Charity for the Relief of poor Widows of Commission and Warrant Officers of the Royal Navy: These are to give Notice to all such Widows whose Husbands died on or since the 30th of August 1732, that Copies of the said Rules and Orders are to be had with the Commissioners of his Majesty's Navy at Chatham, Portsmouth, and Plymouth; as also with the Clerks of the Cheque at Deptford, Woolwich, and Sheerness; and with the Naval Officers at Harwich, Deal, and Kinsale; where they may be informed of all Particulars which entitle them to the Benefit of the said Charity, and receive the proper Certificates for that Purpose. But such Widows as live at too great a Distance from the Places above-mentioned, may apply by Letter to Thomas Corbett, Esq; at the Admiralty Office, who will send them all necessary Information. And the Governors of the said Charity intending to distribute to the Widows of such Sea Officers who died before the 30th of August 1732, and whose Circumstances come within the Rules of the Establishment, their Share of the Bounty granted by Parliament; these are to give Notice of the same to all such Widows, that they may procure the proper Certificates and Affidavits, and send or bring them hither. And the Court of Assistants do hereby give Notice, that they will meet at this Office on Tuesday the 16th of September next, at Eight o'Clock in the Morning, to receive the Claims of such Widows as shall be qualified according to the said Rules and Orders.
