H IS Day Seven-night two Nezpolitan Galliots came in here, and brought with them 60 lufty young Slaves, the Remainder of about 120, the Crews of two Tripolin Galliots they met with and took off of Cape Stilo in Calabria Ulteriore two Days before; and they are now performing Quarantain at this Lazaretto. The same Day also arrived here from Naples the St. Carlo Man of War, a new Ship of 50 Guns, commanded by the Chevalier Mayo, a Knight of Malta; on which are shipped most of the Cannon that have hitherto been fished up from the Spanish Ships sunk here in the Year 1719, which she is to carry back with her to Naples, and may depart in a Day or two.

Petersbourg, Aug. 26, O. S. The Persian Ambassadour having taken his Leave some time ago, is set out on his Return; but there is yet no News of his Succeffor's being arrived

on the Frontiers.

Naples, Sept. 6. This Morning about Four of the Clock the Queen of the two Sicilies was delivered of a Princess. His Sicilian Majesty attended the whole Night, and the Pope's Nuncio, the Amballador of France, the Envoy of Holland, the Minister of Poland, the four Secretaries of State, and all the Lords and Ladies of the Bed-Chamber, were called to be present in the Chamber adjoining to the Queen's; from whence the new born Infant was brought out immediarely by the Marchioness of Sto. Marco, a Roman Lady who is appointed Governess, and shewn to the Company; after which it was baptized by the Name of Mary-Elizabeth.

Dresden, Sept. 7. His Polith Majesty has been pleased to translate M. Grebowski Bishop of Cujavia, to the Bishoprick of Varmia; by which Preferment he likewise becomes a ti-tular Prince of the Empire. He, the Palatin of Cracow, and the Pope's Nuncio, are on their Departure for Poland.

Copenhagen, Sept. 13, N. S. Count Rantzau, the last Stadtholder of Norway, is now appointed Stadtholder of the Island of Fuhnen,

Paris, to compliment the King of Prussia in the Name of his most Christian Majesty, upon his Accession to the Crown.
