A PROCLAMATION.

*Jo. Cant. Harwicke C. Bolton, Devonshire,
Hollis Newcastle, Pembroke.*

WHEREAS this present Parliament stands prorogued to Tuesday the Thirtieth Day of this Instant September; We, with the Advice of his Majesty's Privy Council, do hereby publish and declare, That the said Parliament shall be further prorogued on the said Thirtieth Day of September, to Tuesday the Eighteenth Day of November next; and that We have given Order, that a Commission be prepared for proroguing the same accordingly. And We do hereby further declare his Majesty's Pleasure, That the said Parliament shall, on the said Tuesday the Eighteenth Day of November next, be held and sit for the Dispatch of divers weighty and important Affairs: And the Lords Spiritual and Temporal, and the Knights, Citizens, and Burgesses, and the Commissioners of Shires and Burghs of the House of Commons, are hereby required and commanded to give their Attendance accordingly at Westminster on the said Tuesday the Eighteenth Day of November next.

Given at Whitehall the Twenty-fifth Day of September, in the Fourteenth Year of His Majesty's Reign.

Florence, Sept. 11. On the 7th Instant M. Jodau, the Great Duke's Engineer, returned hither from France, whither he went to procure, and brought with him, a Number of Workmen to be employed at the Iron Mines, which he and a Company of Lorrainers have taken in Farm, in order to make Iron Cannon, Anchors, and all Manner of common Utensils and Works of Iron. On the 8th Sig. Lantero, who in the Month of March last was arrested at Sienna, and kept in Jail here at the Request of the Republick of Genoa, for a Breach of Trust in the publick Banks, was sent from hence to Leghorn, in order to be delivered up to

the Officers of two Gallies of the Republick which are arrived thence to receive him. The last Letters from L. Mar. advise, that the Venetians having of late altered the Course of the River Taro, a Branch of the Po, which was attended with some Damages to Part of the Mantua, the Governor of Mantua had sent a Party of 160 Country Fellows, guarded by two Regiments of Imperial Troops, to demolish the Works the Venetians had made on the Banks of that River.

Copenhagen, Sept. 17, N. S. On the 15th Instant the King and Queen of Denmark came to Town, and took up their Residence at the little Palace of Rosenbourg, where the Council was held Yesterday, but there was no Court. This Morning their Majesties will return to Fredericksbourg, where the rest of the Royal Family have remained. At the same time the Prince of Wirtemberg Old, accompanied by Count Isenbur, the Younger, is to set out upon a short Tour to Germany. Count Stolberg of Juedern, Nephew to Count Wernigerode, arrived here a few Days ago, and is made a Captain in the Regiment of the Prince Royal. On the 15th the Corps of the late General Count Sponeck was interred. Count Laneskold is preparing for a Voyage to the Isle of Bornholm, which lying right against Carlscroon, he proposes to call there in his Way, to view the Swedish Fleet and the Dock. A Vessel arrived from Iceland has brought the annual Present of Halcors. Baron d'Alsebourg arrived here Yesterday, and proposes to pursue his Journey in two or three Days for Stockholm.

Vinna, Sept. 21, N. S. On Sunday the 18th Instant the French Ambassador took his Audience of Leave of the Emperor, in the same Manner as Prince Lichtenstein has done at Paris, and received the usual Present of the Emperor's Picture set with Diamonds.

Berlin, Sept. 24. Yesterday in the Evening the King of Prussia arrived at Iotzdam, and his Majesty being indisposed of an Ague, M. Ellard his chief Physician set out the same Morning for that Place, having received Orders for that Purpose; but his Majesty is nevertheless expected in Town Tomorrow or next Day. It is reported here, that as his Prussian Majesty passed through Brunswick,
