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Warfaw, June 15.

B are making all the preparation we can, to be able to defend our felves, in cale we are attacked by the Turks this Summot; as yet we know nothing but by ungertain reports, which vary daily, and

unzertain reports, which vary daily, and are still published here, rather to please the people, then to give us any true account of the posture of the Ottoman Forces ; however, we defer our expectation , till the return of our Envoy from the Port, who will bring us a certain acco nt of all things . that being his chiefest Errand. In the mean time the general Rendezvous of our Forces is appointed to be at Rubieffow, on the Frontiers of Ruffiz, where his Majesty it is faid, will be prefent, and to that end is preparing for his journey to Samofch, which he will begin the 15 of the next Month, and from thence will pais to our Lady of Sobat, which is very near the place of Rendezvous. The Grand General Sobierski, is not yet arrived here from Pruffia, and from this his flow march, people conjecture, we have no intention of entring into a War this Summer, if it can be avoyded; and the better to ground this opinion, they tell us of Letters come from Caminice, which mention not any preparations of the Turks, unless it be, that the Balla of that place, is vebusie about Fortifying it, which he intends to make much stronger then it has ever been yet. Hanenko General of the Coffacks writes, that his Troops encreafe daily, and that he shall be foon in a condition to render fome confiderable fervice to this Crown.

Rome, June 17. On Munday last his Holiness held a Confiftory, and there made a promotion of five Car-dinals, to fill up as many places, as are at prefent vacant in the Sacred Colledge; one of these five Caps is referved in Petto, and the other four are difpoled of to Signior Francisco Nerli, Florentinesbeing of one of the most Antient and Illustrious Families of that Countrey, of which he is Archbinop, and now Nuncio at the Court of France, and is of about 38 years of age; To Signior Hierome Gustaldi, Genouese, a Man of a great spirir, Treasurer of the Apostolique Chamber, and aged about 60 years; To Signior Hierofme Cafanarti, Native of Naples, though originally of Spaine, kis Family being one of the Noblest in the Kingdom of Arragon, he hath ferved in many great employments; and is 58 years old; and latily, to Signior. Pietre Bafadonna, Venetian, a Perfon of great and emineht Qualities, ha-ting difcharged himfelt in feveral Embaffies which he performed on the part of the State of Venice, with the general efteem of all Perfons, his age is about 60, and he of a very noble Family; It is generally thought, that the fifth Cap, which is referved in Petto, is kept for Signior Calonna de Baffanelle, who hathbeen for fome time extreamly ill, almost without any hopes of his recovery; In the mean time the Court has been very much furprifed at this Promotion, which they thought 5 had been farther off, and now attribute to the infirm-nels of the Pope. On Thursday was again a Confistory, where the Pope gave the Caps to Gustaldi and Casanarri, with the viual Ceremonies; and in the mean time two Perfons of quality are made choice of , to EarTy the Caps of Signior Nerli, who is now returning from France, and to Bafadonna, who is at prefent at Venice. The place of Treafurer is to remain in the hands of Cardinal Guftaldi for fome time at leaft. Some French Ships having given chafe to a Genouefe Veffel off of Givita Vecchia, and the Genouefe endeavoring to fave her felf in that Port, the Govetnor caufed feveral thot to be made at the French, who, he thought, advanced too far in their chafe; of which, complaint having been made here by the French Ambaffador, the Governor is Commanded up, to give an account of his proceeding.

Genoua, June 20. The Senate here is frequently astempled, in order to the finding out fome experient, for the reconciling the prefent mifunderstanding between them and the Crown of France, which it is thought, they will propose to the Sieur Gammont, a: his return from Turin; if it take not effect, we shall be in a great perplexity, things being already fo far gone, that we have reason to fear the confequence. Our Convoy being in all eight fayl, are now come in, from Cadiq, to the great joy of this City, who was in fome apprehension for them, till they faw them arrive.

Vienna, fune 22. Since the return of his Imperial Majefly hither from Laxemburgh, have been neld feveral Councels of Wax, mander to the taking a final refolation, concerning the intended march of our Army, which lies now Encamped at Egra; It is fill faid; that they fhall break up from thence the latter end of this Month, and then proceed towards the Rhyn; Monfieur de Turenne is come we hear with his Army into the County of Waldecke, to obferve our motions. The third inflant arrived here three Dominican Fryers from Persia, bringing Letters with them from that King to the Emperor; They are likewife charged with Letters to the Pope, which they put into the Jands of the Nuncio here, to be by him fent forward to his Holinefs.

Lipstadt, July 1. From Ratisbonne we have advice? that the Duke of Bavaria hath lately caufed a Memorial to be prefented to the Dyet Affembled there, in which he reprefents, That the most Christian King having offered to retire his Troops out of the Empire, with a Protestation that he would not give the least difturbance to any one Member of it, provided his Im-perial Majefty, or any other Prince of the Empire, did¹ fend no Troops to the affultance of the Dutch, to be employed against him, according to the obligation of the Treaty of Munfters which foi bids the fuccoring of any Forreign power against his Majesty; and his Electo-ral Highness farther doclarings That for the procuring the Peace of the Empire, he was ready to joyn his Forces to those of the Empire, to oblige the French to retire out of its Territories, in cale they relolved to coatinue there, contrary to the promile of the most Christian King, to likewife in cafe the Emperor did pretend to fend his Froops again towards the Rhrme, and by that means bring a War into the Entpire, in fivor of the interest of the Datch, that his Electoral High-ness was resolved by all possible means to oppose the passage of the faid Imperial Troops Which Declarat tion, the feveral Deputies met there, were defixed to taks

take notice of, and to communicate to their respective Phincipals, which they have accordingly done.

Answerp, July 4. The most Christian King continues fill with his Forces in the neighborhood of Maestricht; though we have had feveral reports here, as if his Majesty intended to march his Army towards the Rhyne, but without any ground, it being rather thought, that when he removes from Muestricht, he will take his wa towards Breda or Hertogenbolch, and this the Dutch fear-very much ; From the Hague they write, that the loss of Maestricht has quite put them out of all their measures, and that it is faid there, that if the Town had held out but 14 days longer, the Prince of Drange would have relieved it. From Ratisbonne they write, that the French Minister reliding there, had by a late Memorial affured the Diet, that the intentions of the King his Maller, were to obferve inviolably, the Peace of Munster, and that he thould be unwilling to be for-ced to act in prejudice of any of the Members of the Empire ; which however, he must do, in cafe they provoke him to it. His Excellency the Count de Manterey having received lately a confiderable fum of Money from Spain, is about employing part of it for payment of the Soldiery. Several extraordinary Couriers país daily between his Excellency and the States; and the Sieur Beuningen, who was lately here to confer with his Ex-cellency, is returned again to the Hague. The States of the leveral Provinces have, as they tell us, fent in their confents for the ratifying the Treary lately concluded with the Crown of Denmark. From Vienna our Letters all affure us, that the Imperial Army has Orders to march towards the R hyne, but that that Court hath been formewhat perplexed to hear that feveral Princes of the Empire have declared that they will not give passage to thele Troops through their Territories, which will be fo far from contributing towards the Peace of the Empire, that in all likelihood they may occasion a War in it. Monfieur *Turenne* lies still at *Corbach*, his Troops being difpersed in their several quarters in the County of Waldeck ; we are affured, that they make up all together about 24000 Men, and that they are brave Men, and very well disciplin'd. The Emperors Ambaffadors are not yer, as we can hear, arrived at Co-Logne,

Offend, July 6. Passengers arrived from Zealand give us an account, that Velt Marshal Wurts was gone from thence for the Hagueshaving been sent for by the Prince of Orange to be prefent at the Council of War to be held there with all the chief Officers of the Army, concerning the prefent pollure of affairs; and that the Troops which had layn fome time in that Province, were all murched towards Bergen op Zoom; for the Dutch, fince the furrender of Maestricht, apprehending the most Christian King will march towards Breda, begin to draw their Forces that way to fecure those places. Here arrived lately feveral Italian Soldiers, and more are daily expected, to recruit the Regiments in fervice here.

Paris, July 6. The third instant, by Order of the Archbishop of this place, Te Deum was sung in all our Churches, for the happy fuccels of his Majellies Armes before Maestricht, which was followed at night by Bonfires, and other publick demonstrations of joy. Our laft Letters from the Camp, tell us, that at the earnest inftance of the Sicur Fario, Governor of Maestricht, his Majesty had conferred that he should not march out with the Garrifon till on Sunday Morning the 2 instant, when his Majelly likewife intended to enter into the place in Perfon; In the mean time that the Sieur Fario, had been to wait upon his Majesty, as had likewife been several other principal Officers, that had Commanded in the Town, fome of whom had told the King, that before the Siege they had had in the place 1000 Horfe, and I 5000 Foot, and that now they were reduced to 800 Horfe, and 4500 Foot; The Magistrates, the Clergy, the Religious, and the chief Inhabitants of the lown, have all fent their several Deputies to beg of the king, the continuance of their leveral Priviledges, which it is faid, his Majefty has granted them. We are told, that the Dutch Garrison which was in Maestricht, is to march to Hertogenbosch; and that out Troops will Inddainly have Orders to invest Breda; and that the Prince of Conde is on his way to joyn the King with the Forces under his Command.,

Ditte, July 8. From the Camp of the fourth instant we have advice, that the 2 inflant, the Garrison drew out of Maestricht, chrough the Gate of Boisstedue, whither by the Kings appointment they are to march; That the Governor the Sieur Faris came to lafite his Majefty, who received him very kindly ; and that at the fame time our Troops entred into the place ; of which his Majefly has made the Count d' Effrades Governor, the Sieur Le Roy his Majefiles Lieutenant there, as he formerly was at May Jeck, and the Sieur Bontillon Colonel of the Kings Regiment, Major, The Sleur de là Marliere, an antient Reformed Officer, Lieutênant Governor of Wyck, and the Sieur d' Eftienne, Major of that Post; In the mean time the Marquis de Vaubrun is to Command in chief at Mxcstricht, during the absence, of the Count d'Effrades, who is to be at the head of a flying Army. The place of Captain of the Kings Musquereers, void by the death of the Sient d' Artagnan, who fo bravely loft his life in that great Attack that was made upon Macstricht the 27 pail, is given'to Monfieur Fourbin, Major of the Guards; and his place to the Sieur de Brifac, who was before Lieutenant. We are told that the King, who the 3 inftant entred into Maestricht privately, without any folem-nity, is gone to encamp within a League of Viset, having left 6000 Foot, and 1 500 Horfe in Garrison at Maeffricht. From Tournay they write. that the Queen, was disposing her felf to part from thence for Amiens, where the intends to arrive on Saturday the 8 inftant, from whence it is thought, the will return to Compiegne and fo to St. Germains

Whitby, June 29. We have advice, That the Hopes well of this place, Henry Suton Mafter, being lader with Tobacco from Maryland, was in her paffage home, taken by a Dutch Caper, but was afterwards tetaken by her own Men; and carried for Virginia, where the is arrived.

Marmich, July 1. Some days paft's Squadron of Dutch men of War, (though fome speak of their whole Fleet) appeared off of this place, but at a grear distance, infomuch that we could hardly diffinguish them, Yesterday fome Vessels came in, who told us, that they were gone off again towards their own Coaft, excepting eight or nine men of War, who had been met Cruifing off of Orfordnejs. A Vessel come from the Buoy at the Nore, brings advice that His Majesties Fleer is ready to Sayl.
