Whereas his Majesty was pleased by his Order in Council of the 27th of November last; to direct, that an Embargo should be forthwith laid upon all Ships in the Ports of Great Britain, laden or to be laden with Corn, Grain, Starch, Rice, Beef, Pork, or any other Provisions of Victuals to be exported to Foreign Parts: And whereas fince the issuing the said Order, Application hath been made to his Majesty at this Board by several Traders in Rice, and also by several Exporters of Fish, representing, that the Conti-nuing the Embargo upon Ships or Vessels laden or to be laden with Rice, or Fish, will be very detrimental to several of his Majesty's Subjects, who are concerned in the Plantation, and Fishing Trades; His Majesty taking into Consideration the great Advantages that arise to this Kingdom from these valuable Branches of Commerce, doth therefore hereby order, with the Advice of his Privy Council, that all Ships or Vessels laden or to be laden with Rice or Fish, be permitted to proceed on their respective Voyages, notwith standing any Thing contained in the aforementioned Order in Council to the contrary.

And whereas it has been represented to his Majefty at this Board, that several of his Majeity's Subjects, who have already prepared any Quantities of Malted Corn for Exportation, will be exposed to great Inconveniences and Hardthips, if they should be prevented from exporting such malted Corn in due Time, in regard they are obliged by Law, before they begin to steep the same, to give Notice thereof in Writing to the proper Officer, and to keep the same separate from other Corn intended to be made into Malt for Home Confumption, and when dried, to be measured and carried on Ship-board, or put into Store-houses under two Locks and Keys, one for the Proprietor, and the other for the Officer appointed to attend that Service; and that in Case it should appear, that any of the Malt entered, and made for Exportation, shall not within a limited Time after the Working and Drying thereof, and carrying the same into Storehouses, be exported, the Proprietor of the Malt not so exported shall, for every Bushel, forseit the Sum of Five Shillings: His Majesty taking into Consideration the Hard-

AT the Court at St. James's the 6th of his Majesty's Subjects Traders in malted Corn for Exportation, unless some Remedy be pro-vided for the same, is therefore hereby pleased to order, with the Advice of his Privy Council, that all Malt declared or made for Exportation on or before this fixth Day of December, shall and may be exported, notwithstanding the present Embargo; provided the Proprietor or Proprietors thereof shall produce to the Collector, or chief Officer of the Port; where such Malt shall be exported, a Certificate or Certificates from the Officer or Officers with whom the Entry of the Corn intended to be made into fuch Malt for Exportation, shall have been made, that the faid Malt was actually declared or made for Exportation on or before this present sixth Day of December. And the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of his Majesty's Treasury, the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty, and the Lord Warden of the Cinque Ports, are to give the necessary Directions herein; as to them shall respectively appertain.
