gone for Mere, to observe the Motions of the Imperia-lids, who according to the news we have from Vienna, intend to take that way. The Body of Men Commanded by the Duke of Lanemburgh, march but flowly on the other fide of the Menye, the 15 instant at high they lodged at Enstval near Verviers, and Sesterday they intended to quarter at Sare, in the Countrey of Franchiment, and from thence will, as is said here, pass to St Vit, and so continue their march towards Trever, The Marquis de Rochefert, who Commands an other Body of Men, marches towards the Rhyn, to joyn with the Forces Commanded by Monfieur de Turenne. The Count de Lorge, who parted the fifth in-thant, with 6000 from the Camp at Vifet, lodged the tenth in the Villages of Hochiel, and Axel, from whence he was to continue his march, to joyn the Forces bringing together between Boisledue and Greyeceur by the Pince of Conde. Our last letters from Gormany told us, that Monlieur de Turenne had his quarters at Weislar, on the Laen, having beset the passage to Francfort. Monsieur Beuningen is gone hence againfor the Hagues We have advice, that the Count de Larg y With the Forces under his Command, is arrived at Nimmegen. Don Emanuel de Lyra is returned from Galogne.

campferdam, July 17. We have advice that some of our Metchant Men from the Streights, are arrived in the Mix, under the Conyoy of five Men of Way: We are here in great pain for our East-India Ships, which we should be very glad to hear were well arrived in the Texel; we are very much troubled to hear, that the Sickness is got into our Fleet, to that degree, that it is faill, han the Rear-Admiral of the Amsterdam Squadrong has not above 40 sound Men in his Ship, and that the rest of the Ships are much in the same condicion; Our Forces are on their march from Friesland towards, these parts, and so soon as they arrive, will proceed towards the place of Rendezvous, which is appointed to be near Dore; Our Letters from Vienna cell us, that the Emperor seems not resolved to march his Atmycowards these Countreys, but rather that they will take their way towards Lorrain, which the French apprichend, and therefore begin to draw their Forces

that way... Hague, July 13, The Prince of Orange is preparing for to go into the Campagne, and would e're this, have been in the Field, had not the place for the Rendezyougof the Army been altered; it was at first intended to have been at Gergrudenbergh, where they would be near at hand to relieve Hertogenbosch, Bredaj and Bergen of Zoom, but upon the news we now have of the march of the French Forces, it hath been thought fit that several Troops shall be sent towards Fianders... We are in great impatience to hear of the arri-yal of our Ships from the East-Indies, it was reported some days since, that they were come into Bergen in Narway, but nothing has followed. The States of Holland are at present Assembled, and amongst other things, are about making choice of a person to be sent in the quality of Envoye Extraordinary to the Court of Sweden. We wonder much that the late Governor of Macstricht is not yet come hither to make his report of that Siege; in the mean time some talk as if he was to have some other considerable Command forthwith given him, though the want of success in his late Government, has lessened in some measure the esteem many People had of his Conduct. Our Letters from Germany continue to assure us, that the Imperial Argny will now very food begin their marchitowards the Rhyne.

Hague, July 18. The 14 inflammthe Sieur Farie, late Governor of Maestricht, arrived here, the same day he was to wait upon the Prince of Orange, to give his Highness an account of what had passed during the Siege

of that place, and the next Morning he was in the Affembly of the States General on the same account, by whom he was thanked for the great Courage and Conduct he had shown, in the Government of the said place. We were here in great expectation to have heard how the Treaty of Cologne advanced, when the Sieur van Beverning, and the Sieur van Haren, Plenipotentiaties for this State, together with Don Emanuel de Lyra, the Spanish Minister arrived from thence; it is, State, in relation to the Treaty; they have had several private Conferences with the Prince of Grange, the Pentionary Eagell, and the Dupuries of the States, and it is thought, will suddainly return again to Gologne.

We are told that the States having been informed from feveral hands, that the French have an intention to attack Breda of Boisleduc, it hath been resolved to bring a Body of an Army together between those two places, to cover them both; the Princes Regiment of Guards Marched some days since towards Dors, and the rest of our Troops are likewise on their march, that way, and besides, the Count de Monterey, Governos of the Spanish Neatherlands will send 6000 Men as well Horse as Foot, to our assistance. This morning the Prince of Orange, after having had a Conserence, which lasted four hours, with Count Waldeck, the Pentionary Fagell and fome other of the States, is parted towards the place of Rendezvous; and Count Waldeck is Commanded with his Regiment to Gertrudeuburgh. This day about noon it was reported, thap the French had supprized Wesep near Amsterdam. though we are here unwilling to give any credit to its till we here farther; and this evening arrived here an Express from Lieutenant-Admiral de Ruzzer, with an account that the Fleet lay still at Schonevett, but than there was got a pestilentions distemper among the Seamen, of which, great numbers died daily,

Chasteles, July 15. Yesterday his most Christian Majesty arrived here with 3000 Horse, and this Morning continued his march towards Grandpre, where the Queen expects his arrival, and from thence the Conra will remove to Mere. The Infantry hath Orders to

march directly for Lorraine.

* Calais, July 21. This day his Grace the Duke of Monmouth arrived here in fix days from Chaftelet, near, Charleray, where he took his leave of the most Christiy an King, having been received with extraordinary Respect and Civility, by the Governors of the respective Towns he passed through. His Grace hath ordered his Equippage to march along with the Body of the Army, that it might be in a readiness against his return. This, afternoon his Grace, after having been entertained in a particular manner by our Governor, went on Board the, Yacht which attended him, in order to his passed to England.

Whitehal, Iuly 12. This evening his Grace the Duke of Monmouth arrived here from the French Camp, and was very kindly received by his Majesty and the

whole Court.
