General Brown however was at last obliged to retire, and the Prussians came before the Town of Neiss, where they made Dispositions as if they intended to give a general Assault; but the Garrison having made a very brisk Fire with their Cannon and Small Arms, by which several of the Prussians were killed, his Prussian Majesty thought proper to do by that Town as he had done by Glogow, which is to block it up; after which his Prustian Majesty lest the Command of the Army in Silelia to Felt-Marshal Count Schwerin, and fet out on the 24th Instant on his Return to this Place, where he arrived on Sunday the 29th at Noon, accompanied by Prince William his Brother, and leveral Officers of Distinction.
