Rome, January 28, N. S.

THE 20th being the Birth-Day of the King of Naples, Cardinal Acquaviva was complimented by the Cardinals Ruffo, Passeri, Fini, and Caraffa, and by the Princes and Nobility Subjects and Feuditaries of the Two Sicilies. On this Occasion, in the Evening his Eminency gave an Entertainment of Musick. On the 24th, the Obsequies for the late Emperor were celebrated by the German College at the Church of St. Apollinaire, at which several Cardinals assisted. On the 26th the Tyber overflowed, occasioned by the late extraordinary Rains, the Waters rising so high that the Government was obliged to send Bread and other Provisions about the City in Boats, to supply the People that by the Inundation were confined to their Houses.

Florence, Feb. 5. On the 29th past, the first Column of Austrian Troops arrived at Pontremoli from Lombardy. On the 30th at Night a Messenger was dispatched by the Regency to the Great Duke of Tuscany, to settle a Supply for the extraordinary Expences which the Body of Austrian Troops from Lombardy into Tuscany will occasion. On the 31st, the Regiment of Lorrain Foot-Guards in Garrison in our Castles, was reviewed, and 600 Men were chosen in order to join the Austrian Troops in the Sieneſe. M. de Braitwitz is preparing his Field Equipage, and all Manner of military Stores are getting ready at the Old Castle. A Body of 3000 Foot, and a Party of Horse of the Austrian Troops from Lom-

bardy, are expected to arrive in a few Days at Viareggio, in their March to Pisa, Empoli, &c. the Places of their Rendezvous, where the necessary Preparations are made for their Reception.

Berlin, Feb. 18. On Thursday last his Prussian Majesty came to Town from Potzdam, and the same Day declared his Intention of setting out for his Army in Silesia To-morrow the 19th Instant. His Prussian Majesty's own Regiment of Guards of three Battallions, which had moved from Ruppin to Potzdam, set out two Days ago from this latter Place on their March for Silesia. Messieurs Gotter and Cocceii having desired to be excused from going to Franckfort, upon the Foot proposed to them; the King of Prussia has named two other Ambassadors, viz. M. Schwerin, his Master of the Horse, and M. Zumbroich, one of his Ministers of State.
