Vienna, February 25.

GENERAL Brown has sent a Courier to acquaint this Court that he is posted between Brunn and Olmutz with the Body of Troops he commands, waiting for Reinforcements and further Orders. It is said Field Marshal Count Neiperg is appointed to command in Chief the Forces that are to act against the Prussians; and several Regiments are ordered to march with all Diligence to Moravia, where it is hoped a considerable Army will soon be drawn together. The Militia of that Country have had Orders sent them to post themselves in the best Manner they can for the Defence of the Passes on the Frontiers towards Silesia.

Dresden, Feb. 26. On the 24th Instant Baron Jaxheim, Envoy Extraordinary from the Queen of Hungary, arrived here, and Yesterday had a private Audience of the King: To Day he sets out for Hanover. Orders have been given for 20000 Men to get in Readiness to march by the End of next Month; when it will be signified to them what Route they are to take. The King holds frequent Councils; and Yesterday Couriers were dispatched to several Courts.

Berlin, March 4. It is advised from Silesia, that his Prussian Majesty having held a great Council of War at his Head Quarters at Schweidnitz, it was resolved to begin the Campaign with the Siege of Great Glogow, in which Count Wallis commands; he has but a small Garrison, and the Place is so ill provided for Defence, that 'tis reckoned it cannot hold out long.

Whitehall, March 3.

Orders are sent to Spithead for his Majesty's Ships the Kent, Grafton, Bristol, Scarborough, and Pembroke Prize, to sail for Jamaica with several Transports under their Convoy.

Orders are also sent for his Majesty's Ships the Bristol and Lively to sail for Corke, and to take under their Convoy all the Transports lying ready there, for Jamaica.
