THE Colonels of Foot here have received Orders to provide Cloathing for an additional Number of Eight Men a Company, which the King has settled Measures for their being furnished with in case of a sudden March. The Officers of the Cavalry are likewise ordered to make an actual Augmentation of ten Men each Troop, and 64 Men are to be added to the Artillery Companies.

Vienna, Feb. 25, N. S. The Prussians have taken Jablunka, which opens a Passage in the Mountains out of Silesia into Hungary. They found in it a Magazine of Salt to the Value of 300000 Florins. The Elector of Bavaria proposes to have 14000 Foot and 6000 Horse ready by May. He has already ordered three Regiments to march towards Passau.

Berlin, March 4. When the King of Prussia left this Place, on Sunday the 19th past, to go to Silesia, it was the Talk at Court that his Majesty did not propose to return hither till after the Campaign is quite over; for the opening of which the greatest Preparations of all Kinds have been making here, and with incredible Diligence. The second Train of heavy Artillery which was sent from hence the 27th of last Month in several Vessels, consists of 50 Cannon all Twenty-four Pounders, and 16 Mortar Pieces, with suitable Stores of Ammunition. The raising of Recruits, and the forming of new Regiments have been carried on with unusual Expedition; all Servants are enlisted, and all Horses that are found fit for Service are taken up. Since his Prussian Majesty's Accession to the Crown, his Army has been augmented with 20 Battallions and 35 Squadrons, and his whole Forces now amount to above One Hundred Thousand Men.
