Dresden, March 1.

Count Perouse, Minister from the Elector of Bavaria to this Court, arrived here Yesterday. His Polish Majesty has been for two or three Days past confined to his Room by Pains in his Legs, but is much better this Morning.

Copenhagen, March 4. The necessary Orders are actually issued out for putting the Troops appointed for the Service of the King of Great Britain into a marching Condition; and Preparations are making accordingly.

Vienna, March 15, N. S. On the 13th Instant in the Morning the Queen of Hungary was happily delivered of a Prince, to the inexpressible Joy of her Subjects. The same Evening Prince Hildburghausen in the Name of the King of Poland, and Cardinal Colonitz in the Name of the Pope, assisted as Godfathers at the Christening: After which the Grand Duke, in Quality of Sovereign of the Golden Fleece, created the young Prince a Knight of that Order. Count Esterhazi, Count Kautnitz, Count Wilsheek, and Count Gaudick, set out this Day, the first for Brussels, the Hague, London, and Lisbon; the second for Turin, Florence, and Rome; the third for Dresden, Wolfen-

buttel, and Petersbourg; and the fourth for Paris, to notify the Birth of the Arch-Duke. This is the third and last Day of publick Rejoycings for it in this Capital.

Notice is hereby given, pursuant to the late Act for the Amendment of the Law relating to Actions on the Statute of Hue and Cry, That on Tuesday the 10th Day of March Instant, William Pears, of the Parish of Crowland, in the Ports of Holland and County of Lincoln, Farmer, about Six of the Clock in the Afternoon of the same Day, as he was riding from Spalding in the said Ports and County, to his Dwelling-house in the Parish of Crowland, aforesaid, was assaulted and stopped in the King's Highway, on a Bank leading from the Parish of Moulton in the said Ports and County, to Whelpload Drove; which said Bank is in the said Parish of Moulton and within the Hundred of Elloe, in the Ports and County aforesaid, by two Men, each about the Age of Thirty Years, and who were and yet are unknown to the said William Pears; the one riding upon a white Mare, and the other upon a dark brown Horse or Mare; one of whom was of a middle Size, had on a light-colour'd frait Great Coat, and a light-colour'd Wig; the other a tall Man, had on a light-colour'd Coat with a Belt about him, and a light-colour'd Wig;

Wig; and he was armed with a Pistol, which he pulled out and threatened to shoot the said William Pears, if he did not stand still; and they then and there robbed the said William Pears, and took from him Twelve Guineas, Forty-eight Shillings, and some Halfpence, and a Silver Watch of the Value of Five Pounds; they also took off his Mare's Bridle, and then rode away with the same.

Notice is hereby given, pursuant to the late Act, that on the 5th Day of March Instant, Edward Cragg, of the Parish of Bnatham, in the West Riding of the County of York, was about One of the Clock in the Afternoon of the same Day, as he was travelling upon the Highway over Henfield Common, leading between Haddingden and Whalley, in the County of Lancaster, assaulted by a little broad Man, with a cheque Shirt on, a Green Waistcoat, a light blue Coat, and a little bob-Wig, who knocked the said Edward Cragg down, and before he could arise, renewing his blow, laid him flat on the Ground; upon which a tall thin Man, with his own Hair, and a whitish coloured Coat, that was before at some Distance, came up to them, and drawing a Pistol and presenting it at the said Edward Cragg, told him he should dye if he stirred or resisted, upon which they tied the said Edward Cragg's Hands upon his Back, and his Feet close together, and then searched his Pockets, and by force took from thence One Hundred and Forty Five Pounds and Six-pence Half-penny: And also that a Man leading a saddled Horse by the Head, stood at a very small Distance, being dressed in a light coloured close bodied Coat, being a little slender Man, and his Horse white, after the two Persons before described had made use, tarried not far from him for some Time, and afterwards mounting his Horse, and riding about Thirty Yards, turned back towards the said Edward Cragg, upon which the said Edward Cragg as he lay bound expecting to be killed, cried out for Mercy, upon which they rode off the same Way the tall Man before described.
