Stockholm, February 26.

BARON Gyllenstierna, Secretary to Count Gyllenborg, having been at Supper last Night at M. Bestuchef's, Minister from Russia, with other Company, was arrested as he came out of his Houſe by five Soldiers, and carried to Prison.

Vienna, March 15. The Prussians have abandoned Jablunka, after having set Fire to the Place; and there is News of an Action, wherein 200 Husſars are said to have killed several Prussians, and taken some Prisoners.

Berlin, March 21. There is Advice from Schweidnitz in Silesia, that the King of Prussia had caused a Gentleman called M. Buckwitz, and a Jew, who both lived in that Town, to be put to Death for holding, as 'tis said, a private Correspondence with General Lentulus.

Brussels, March 25, N.S. There was a splendid Appearance at Court the 23d Instant, upon the News of the Queen of Hungary's being safely delivered of a Prince. The Archduchess dined for the first Time in publick since her Recovery, and received in the Afternoon the Congratulations of the Deputies of the States of Brabant. This Day the Archduchess went in State to the principal Church, and the Guns were fired three Rounds. The Court is this Day, and will be again To-morrow, out of Mourning.
