Yarmouth, Decemb. 4. Prize, the Rumsey Bark, delivered for His Majessies Service. On Wednelday went out the Golden Lamb, taken by the Mermaid, who proved to be a Danish Vessel, was delivered, and all the Goods without the least imbezlement to the Mafter.

Sherborn in the County of Dorfet, Dec. 5. 'I's now five Weeks when the Sickness first brake forth in four houses of this Town, and fince that time not any other house infected. Only one person died of the Plague these twenty dayes, so that laft Saturday we had a plentifull Marker of Corn and other Provisions; and several that left the Town are now come

Provincin, and reverse that left the town are now come home, and others preparing for their return.

Portfinish, Dec. 5. Yesterday came hither 150 Souldiers, flout Men, taken one of His Majesties Guards, who at their going abroad, expressed great alactity and cheerfulness for the Service they go upon.

Wilmar, Novemb. 20. Two days fince arrived eight Companies of old German Souldiers, confifting of about fixteen hundred Men, belonging to Col. Delmick, who, with those which came before, are to be quartered in the adjacent Villages. Their march is deferred till the arrival of the Field-Heer, and then a General Muster will be made. Two ships are expected from Finland, with Souldiers, to keep this Garrifon, whilft the old Souldiers are drawn out. Sixteen Lafts of Gun powder, and four thousand Muskets are brought in hither, their defign is not yet known, but their march is faid to be to the Elbe, the Artillery being already upon the way toward Stoad.

Hambiagh, Nev. 25. The Ambassador from Denmark, Ha. aibal Schessed, past this Town on Tucsday, last for Holland; whence, after a small stay, he is designed for England. The River of Elbe, by the late great Snows and Frost, is made scarce navigable.

Vienna, Nov. 18. On Monday last his Imperial Majesty gave Audience to the Polish Ambassador, in which after the Condo. lence of the late King of Spain's death, he acquainted his Majesty that he had orders to make an end of the difference concerning the Principallities of Ratibor and Oppelen, and the pre-tention of the Jesuites of One Million and fifty thousand Florins affigned thereupon; and that he would accept of the payment of One Million and ten thousand Florins (for which fum the faid Principallities stand ingaged to the Queen of Poland) to be made to the Duke of Anguien's Agent, the Queen having granted the faid fum to his Master. The Count of Sinfendorff Great Chancellor of the Court being dead, Dr Hecker the Vice Chancellor is to succeed him. The Turk sh Chiaux is dispatcht with presents and assurance that those shall be se-verely punished that have endamaged the Turks by their late Incursions, and that care shall be taken hereaster for preferving better order amongst them.

Venice, Nov. 20. Two Vessels are arrived in this Ports with the Christian Slaves sent from the Armada by the Cap tain General, who after flaying there Quarantane, are to have Palports to their leveral Countries. The Letters from Zant of the first instant, fay, that there are above fixty Sayl in Harbor, and above five thousand Soldiers in the Town ready to be embarqued. A Smyrna Vessel brings letters from Constant preparations for Sea against this Republick, and that the English Ambassador had freed four English ships who were stay at Smyrna to transport the Militia for Canea, The Vessels appointed to carry Succours for the Army are in readiness. and the Provisions and So'diery embarqued to set sayl with the first wind.

Hague, Dec. 7. Baron Langerac's Trumpeter who kill'd the young Rhinegrave is executed, his Hand and Head cut off the young Annegrave is executed, his traine and frequent one the Hand and Piffol nailed to the Gallowes, and the Head fer-upon a Pole; a punifiment allotted as well for the juffificati-on of the Baron's Henor, as in example to such Offenders. Allyance with his Mafter, gives out, That the Bishop of Munfter hath sube mitted all his Concern in this War against the States to his Mafter; but we cannot believe there is any thing of it, or if it be, that it is more then a Complement,

The Sieur Friquet on the other fide gives out, his Maffer and the Empire grows jealous of the French Councels in their Succors, believing their aim is to gather an Army in West. phalia, with which, to break in upon the Empire, fo that they must not think it strange if the Emperor provide upon the Defensive.

The difference in dispute between its and the King of France, about the disposing of vacant Commands in his Succors, raiseth greater Jealousses in us, it being on his part a plain contravention of the Treaty in that point, and makes us apprehend he means to keep his Forces as a Body apart for fome farther defign.

The Brandenburgh Ministers are faid to have delivered in a Project of an Alliance with the Stares, but of such a nature that the States can in no way agree too; however, we shall so far consider our own Interest (be it only to gain time).
