## Kienna, April 26, N. S.

N the 23d the Queen went abroad for the first Time fince her Lyingin. Publick Rejoycings and Illuminations were continued that Day and the next. There was no Proof of Duty and Affection for her Majesty omitted by the People, Some of the principal Nobility were at a very great Expence in Illuminations. What was the moft remarkable, was that in fuch crowded Streets, where Numbers of Turks and Prullian Deferters were ftraggling and gazing with the common People, the Queen, accompanied with the two Archdutcheffes, went in an open Landau with two Horles, and only two common Ser-vants, through the whole Town at Night ; the Great Duke was on Horfeback with a Party of Courtiers, and Prince Charles on Foot. On the 20th Inftant M. de Maupertuis, the famous French Mathematician, arrived here, after having fallen into the Hands of the Hullars in Silefia on the Joth, and been carried Prifoner by them to Troppau; from whence he made himfelf known by Letter to the Field-Marshal Count Neiperg, who lent him a Paffport and 200 Florins to enable him to reach Vienna. He alighted at Count Harrach's, the Prefident at War, where he learned that Prince Leichtenstein was here, and immediately repaired to the Houle of the latter, who, from an old Acquaintance with him in France, received him in the kindeft Manner. The Account he gives of his being made a Prifoner, is, that having feen at a little Diffance from a neighbouring Height one of the Wings of the Pruffian Army broke on the first At-tack, he gave all for lost, and therefore tried to make the best of his Way back to Breslau, upon a Peasant's Horse without Stirrups; and in that Equipage he had been picked up by the Austrian Huss. We have an Account, that the Pruffians have made an Attempt to surprize Brieg, as they did Glogow, but M. de Picolomeni having

had previous Advice, repulled the 2000 Men who were fent for that Purpofe, and who fince retired to the main Army at and behind Olaw; where it is faid a great Number of Fascines and other Preparations are making for a Siege in Form.

Berlin, April 29, N.S. There is no News from Silefia, both Armies being very quiet; 'tis advifed only, that fince the Action at Molwitz, the Auftrian Hullars are much more troublefome than before, and make Excursions as far as Bressau and a great way on this Side, which makes the Roads very infecure for Travellers:

Hamburgh, May 2, N.S. The Danish Trodps begin to move out of their Quarters, and Count Illenburg's Regiment of Horfe is actually marching towards Rendesburg, where it will be joined by other Regiments that are coming from Denmark, in order to form a Body of 6000 Men, appointed to be in Readinels to march to the Affiftance of her Hungarian Majefty.
