Whitehall, June 27.

UPON Intelligence of the Spanish Squadron being at Sea, Rear-Admiral Haddock proceeded with his Squadron through the Straights-Mouth, in Company with the Turkey and Mediterranean Fleet, and convoyed them as far as Cape St. Vincent, where they parted on the 31st of May, and, with Convoy home, they are now happily arrived. The Admiral continues cruizing in those Parts with twelve Sail of the Line, besides Frigates.

Sir John Norris writes from St. Helen's, that on the 25th in the Afternoon he failed with his Squadron from Spithead to that Place, and hoped to proceed to Sea the next Day.
