And also, that a new Branch will then be erected for the Convoiance of Letters three Days in every Week between Bristol, Bath, Frestord, Bradford, Frowbridge, Melksham, Devizes, Lavington, Westbury, Froom, Warminster, Heitsbury, Wilton and Salisbury.
