Turin, June 24.

ON Wednesday Night last, about Eleven of the Clock, the Queen of Sardinia was happily delivered of a Prince at the Venetia, after a tedious Labour that lasted the whole Day. The Court was to have returned to Turin on the Thursday, in order to that Princel's lying in here, her Reckoning being up; but she must now continue there for 40 Days longer, notwithstanding the Heats which render that Place both disagreeable and unhealthy. The King of Sardinia received the next Morning the Compliments of all the Nobility, Magistracy, and Foreign Ministers. The young Prince, who it is thought will be stiled Duke of Chablais, was only sprinkled, his Christening being deferred till the Return of the Court hither, and till the Pope, whom the King of Sardinia has desired to stand Godfather, has signified his Acceptance of the Invitation. The Queen of Sardinia is perfectly well, and this happy Event has filled the Minds of their Sardinian Majesties, and this whole Court, with the greatest Joy. It is said that the last Courier from Rome, has brought the final Conclusion of all the Affairs that were in Dispute between the King of Sardinia and the See of Rome; in Consequence of which, the remaining Ecclesiastical Benefices will immediately be filled up by his Sardinian Majesty. Sig. Mentini, who came to settle the said Agreement, will very soon take upon him the Character of the Pope's Nuncio at this Court. This Morning the King of Sardinia has named the Baron Blonay, Captain of the first Troop of his Horse Guards, Vice-Roy of the Island of Sardinia, in the Room of Count Dapremont, whose three Years are now near expired.
