Naples, June 13, N. S.

ON the 29th past Orders were given from the Secretary of State's and from the War Office, for getting in Readiness, by the End of this Month, the large Train of Artillery, Ammunition, and military Stores which they are at Work about in our Arsenal. On the 30th a Person arrived at Court (then at Portici) with Credentials from the Boy of Tripoly, to terminate the Treaty of Commerce between the two Sicilies and that Regency. On the 31st their Majestys and the young Princess, attended by their respective Courts, returned to this City. On the 2d Instant a Courier arrived at Court from Constantinople, with Dispatches from Sig. Finochietti the King's Ambassadour, giving an Account of his Arrival there on the 8th of May with the Ships of War St. Philip and Parthenope, and of his publick Entry and Entertainment at the Porte with the same Formalities that are allowed to the French Ambassadour. He had had an Audience of the Grand Signior when he delivered the Presents that were sent to his Highness in those two Ships. On the 6th Sig. Sangro, a Lieutenant General of the King's Forces, returned hither from taking a View of the Garrisons, Fortifications, and Magazines of our Places on the Borders of Tuscany, and waited on his Majesty to lay before him a Report of the Condition in which he found them. On the 8th a Barbary Row-Boat Cruizer, belonging 'tis thought to Tunis, boarded a French Vessel which the Day before sailed from this Port laden with Wine, kill'd the Crew and four Passengers, viz. a Knight of Malta, and three Officers of the King's Regiment and of that called the Regiment of Burgundy, and after having plundered the Vessel left it adrift with only a Boy on board. It was driven by the Wind to the Island of Panza. The Differences between this Court and that of Rome are intirely adjusted to mutual Satisfaction, and the Articles of this Accomodation have been signed and ratified by the respective Parties.

Naples, June 20, N. S. On the 14th past Advice from Malta, that the Ships of War St. Philip and Parthenope, had put into that Port on their Return from Constantinople. The King has ordered a Com-

mission to be issued, appointing a new Tribunal here for examining such Ecclesiastical Causes as are referred to the Crown, and also for levying a certain Tax yearly on the Ecclesiastical Revenues in this Kingdom, pursuant to the Articles of Agreement made with the Court of Rome.

Vienna, July 5, N. S. On the 25th of last Month the Coronation of the Queen of Hungary was performed at Presbourg with great Solemnity and Magnificence, and with all the Ceremonies and Formalities observed on such Occasions in that Kingdom. Her Majesty was crowned in the Church of St. Martin. From thence a Procession was made by the principal Officers of the Kingdom, the Prelates, Nobility, Barons, and Knights of St. Stephen, who attended in their proper Habits and in great Number, on Horseback; her Majesty being in her Coach. They all passed out of the City towards a Convent, before which a Scaffold was erected in the open Field, and covered with Cloth; her Majesty ascending it, with the Primate, Palatine, Bishops and Barons, took an Oath, holding up her Right Hand in publick View, to maintain the Liberties and Privileges of the Kingdom. Thence the Procession moved towards the Danube, and being come, according to ancient Custom, to a certain Rising Ground, her Majesty alighted from her Coach, and mounting a Horse with rich Furniture, drew a Sword, and turning to the four Quarters of the World, flourished it every Time she turned, in Token that she would defend the Kingdom against its Enemies on all Sides. Our last Advices from the Army in Silesia, are dated from Neiss the 30th past: A Party of the Austrians had on the 27th intercepted 14 Waggons loaded from Breslau, killing some of the Prussians that guarded them, and putting the rest to Flight. The Prussian Army was advanced again a little nearer to ours, and had posted themselves at Wanlen, between Strelen and Brieg.

Brunswick, July 17, N. S. By a Courier dispatched from Mittau, this Court has received the agreeable News, that on the 27th past the States of Courland chose unanimously for their Duke and Sovereign, Duke Lewis, Brother of the Duke Regent of Brunwick, and of Duke Anthony Ulrich Consort of the Grand Dutchess, Regent of Russia. On which Occasion great Rejoicings have been made here.
