*Petersburg, June 20.*

**T**HE first Column of two Regiments of Foot is expected here Tomorrow, and Felt-Marshal Lacy, with General Keith and others, will go to review them, and see them pass the River about three Miles above this Town to the Wibourg Side, where General Keith is to command, and will have under him a Body of 30,000 Men. There will soon be in this Neighbourhood, and distributed into convenient Quarters, 80 Battalions of Foot, which make 64,000 Men. There are likewise 20,000 Horse or Dragoons ordered this Way. There are in Garrison at Riga five Regiments, three at Revel, one at Narva, five here, three at Cronstadt, three at Wibourg, and one at Kexholm, which amount to 25,000 Men; besides the three Regiments of Foot-Guards and one of Horse, which make 10,000 more. M. Nolken the Swedish Minister set out this Morning on his Return home; he had his Audience of Leave of the Great Dutchess last Sunday Morning. Letters from Mittau bring an Account, that M. Korff had been chosen Marshal for the approaching Election of a Duke of Courland. The Russian Fleet at Cronstadt is composed of 15 Ships of the Line, two Bomb-Vessels two Prahmes, and two Frigates; on Board one of which Rear-Admiral Bars's Flag is hoisted.

*Petersburg, June 23.* On the 21st Instant an Express arrived here from Mittau, with the News of the Prince of Brunswick Wolfenbuttel's having been elected Duke of Courland by the unanimous Consent of the States of that Country, who immediately ordered a Deputation to be sent to Dresden to inform the King of Poland of this Election, and to desire his Majesty's and the Republick of Poland's Confirmation of it. The Prince Generalissimo has dispatched one of his Aids de Camp to Mittau, to congratulate the new Duke his Brother on this Occasion, and to conduct him hither, for whose Reception an Apartment in the Summer Palace is fitting up; as is the Great Dutchess's also in the Winter Palace for her Highness's Lying-in. The Turkish Ambassador having set out from Novogorod by Water, is supposed to

be arrived at Stutzelbourg, and is expected here in a few Days.

*Vienna, July 12.* The Queen of Hungary, and his Royal Highness the Great Duke, came hither Yesterday at Noon to see the Empress Mother, and they returned this Afternoon to Presbourg by Water. On the 10th Instant Advice came by an Express, that the Queen of Sardinia, his Royal Highness's Sister, having been delivered of a Prince, died some Days after; to the great Grief of this Court.
