Whitehall, July 25.

ON the 23d Instant at Night arrived here Captain Peyton, Commander of his Majesty's Ship the Kennington, with Letters to his Grace the Duke of Newcastle his Majesty's Principal Secretary of State, from Vice Admiral Vernon, dated from Port Royal Harbour in Jamaica, June 13, with the following Advices.

On the 2d of May Captain Davers, Commander of his Majesty's Ship the Suffolk, with five Men of War and a Tender, got out of the Harbour of Carthagena, having received Orders from the Admiral to proceed off of Santa Martha, and to continue cruising there for 20 Days, and at the Expiration thereof to sail with the said Ships for Port Royal in Jamaica.

The entire Demolition of all the Forts and Castles of the Harbour of Carthagena having been completed, and the greatest Part of the Men of War, and the Transports with the Land Forces on board, being got out to Sea, the Admiral sailed for Jamaica on the 6th of May. On the 7th he was joined off Point Canoa by Sir Chaloner Ogle with 14 Sail, and on the 9th had the whole Squadron with him, except the Boyne, the Burford, and the Prince Frederick: The two latter of which afterwards joined him at Sea, the Boyne having proceeded directly for Jamaica. On the 19th the Squadron arrived in Port Royal Harbour, where the Admiral found the Convoy Victuallers and Storeships safely arrived from England some Days before him. He also found there his Majesty's Ship the Squirrel, commanded by Captain Warren, who had met with and destroyed a large Spanish Privateer Sloop on the South Part of Cuba.

On the 21st Advice was brought in by Ships from Porto Bello, that the Spaniards there had Intelligence that Commodore Anson with his Squadron had got round Cape Horn into the South Seas, and had appeared off of Arica; and that the Spanish Admiral Fizarro, who had followed Commodore Anson's Squadron, had lost his Passage round the Cape, and was put into Buenos Ayres.

On the 24th died, after a few Days Illness at Jamaica, Lord Augustus Fitz Roy, Commander of his Majesty's Ship the Orford, much regretted for his Bravery and Diligence in the Service.

On the 25th Captain Mostyn, Commander of his Majesty's Ship the Deptford, came into Port Royal from Cruizing off Santa Martha, and brought in with him a Ship bound from Cadiz with Provisions, Naval Stores and Iron for Carthagena; she had put into Santa Martha, where she landed Part of the Provisions to be conveyed to Carthagena, and was taken going with the rest of the Cargo for the Havannah.

Vice-Admiral Vernon and Brigadier Wentworth were making Preparations in order to proceed again to Sea with all possible Expedition.
