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Petersbourg, June 30.

ON the 23d Instant, the Turkish Ambassadour Mahomet-Emini-Pacha, arrived at Cloyster Neski, a Convent about three English Miles above this Town, where he encamped. Yesterday Morning he made his publick Entry: The three Regiments of Foot-Guards, and five other Regiments formed a Line on each Side from the Entrance of the Town to the Ambassador's Lodgings, and his March with his Retinue was preceded by a Squadron of the Horse Guards, and closed by another. His Retinue and Equipages were pretty numerous. The Prince of Brunswick, the new elected Duke of Courland, arrived here Yesterday in the Afternoon, and went directly to the Summer Palace, which was prepared for his Reception. There are in our Gally-Haven upwards of 70 Gallies lying in two Lines within the Port; there are also 10 or 12 Gallies at Cronstadt; all compleatly rigged, and in Order to go to Sea at a Moment's Warning. They have each from 8 to 12 Seamen for the navigating Part, that is steering and handling the Sails, besides the Gunners, who are all on board; so that there wants nothing but Orders for the Land-Forces to go on board to row them, which is the Post of Honour even for the Guards. These 80 Gallies will carry 20,000 Men, who are all to work at the Oar, and to act as Marines against an Enemy. In this Number of Gallies are comprehended 13 for Cavalry, which carry 16 Horse apiece, and seven more are preparing; so that they may have 320 Horse on board, which they can embark and land with great Facility. The Horses are commodiously stowed below, and these Gallies have the same Complement above as the others. The Turkish Ambassadour was this Morning conducted by the Privy Counsellor M. Nepluef, in one of the Court Coaches, to a private Audience of the Prince Generalissimo. The Ambassador complimented his Highness upon the Birth of the young Monarch, and the good Understanding between the two Powers. The Prince made him a suitable Reply, and then the other retired. To-morrow the said Ambassador is to visit

the Chief Minister Count Osterman. M. Swart, Resident here of the States-General, and M. Rumpf Envoy of the said States at Stockholm, have each of them presented to the respective Courts, a Memorial of the same Tendency, viz. Their High Mightinesses having been informed to their great Regret, that such Differences have arisen between the Crowns of Sweden and Russia, as are likely to endanger the Tranquility of the North, in the Preservation of which they are so much interested; their High Mightinesses ardently wish to see Harmony and good Understanding reestablished between them. And have therefore instructed their Ministers, to intreat the said Courts respectively to communicate to them the State of those Differences; to the End that after mature Examination of them, they may interpose their good Offices for renewing that Concord which has for so many Years subsisted between the two Powers.

Vienna, July 19, N. S. On the 15th Instant, Field-Marshal Prince Lobkowitz set out from hence for Bohemia, to take upon him the Command of the Troops which are to draw together on the Frontiers of that Kingdom, towards the upper Palatinate. The Queen of Hungary, with her Consort the Great Duke of Tuscany, continues at Presbourg, only coming hither sometimes on Visits to the Imperial Family. On the 15th Count Uhlefeld, Ambassador newly returned from Constantinople, made a magnificent Entry, with his numerous Retinue, into Presbourg; and being introduced by the Count de Herberstein the High Chamberlain, had an Audience of the Queen and afterwards of his Royal Highness the Great Duke; and the Ambassador returned in the same Order he came, to his Camp, situate without the Town on the Side of the Danube. It has been resolved to raise 15000 Recruits, to be furnished by the Hereditary Provinces; the States of which Provinces are soon to assemble, to settle their respective Proportions to that Levy. Yesterday Count Uhlefeld arrived here. Our last Advices from Silesia intimate, that Count Neyperg was making Dispositions to pass the Neiss with the Austrian Army. The Prussians continued incamped at Strehlen;
