Naples, July 4, N. S.

THE Person who lately arrived here from Tripoly, after having concluded and figned a Treaty of Commerce and Navigation between the Subjects of the King of the Two Sicilies and those of that Regency, set out from hence on the 20th past for Rome on his Return to Tripoly, the Expences of his Journey be-ing defrayed by this Court as far as Fondi the Confines of the Ecclesiastical State. On the 21st Six Brass Cannon for Battery were cast here for the King's Service, and are placed in the Arsenal. On the 24th the Baggage of the Duke di Castropignano, our late Ambassador at the Court of France, was landed here by a French Vessel from Marseilles. On the 28th Conding! Cossing with the 18th Conding! the 28th Cardinal Coscia, who lately came hither from Rome, had a private Audience of their Majesties. On the 29th seventy Men, who for various Crimes had lately been condemned to work for a certain Time on the Fortifications of the Fortresles of this Kingdom, were brought hither from Capua, and being joined here by Twenty more under the like Condemnation, they were put on board the Gallies on the 2d Instant, in order to be distributed in the garrison'd Places on the Borders of Tuscany. On the 2d M. de la Vieuville, his Majesty's Ambassador to the King of Sardinia, took Leave of the King and Queen, and embarked on board the Gal-

lies for Genoa, in his Way to Turin.

Rome, July 8, N. S. A few Days ago
the Duke di Castropignano, late Ambassador from the King of the Two Sicilies at the French Courty set out from hence with his Lady on his Return to Naples.

Leghorn, July 14, N. S. On the 3d Infant the Great Duke's Gallies came in from Porto Ferraio, whence they brought several Pieces of Brass Cannon. On the 7th came into this Port his Britannick Majesty's Ships the Dursley and Mahon, the former from Cruizing; and the latter from Lisbon, which the same Day sailed again. On the 11th a Neapolitan Ship arrived at this Port in seven Days from Naples, and brought Advice, that two Neapolitan Gallies had convoyed to Port Ercele six Transports. Sour of voyed to Port Ercole fix Transports, sour of

them with Cavalry, and two with Recruits of Foot, for the Garrisons on the Borders of Tuscany. The said Gallies, which have on board the Ambassador of the King of Naples to the Court of Turin, were obliged by contrary Wind to anchor at Port Ferraio, on their Voyage to Genoa.

Florence, July 16, N. S. On the 4th Ine frant the French Ambassador M. de St. Aignan having spent some Days in viewing the Curiosities of this City, and made several Visits to the Electress Dowager Palatine's Court, fet out for Lucca, whence he returned hither on the 8th, and on the 10th departed for Loretto, Fisteen hundred Carbines are making here by Direction of the Government, for a new Regiment of Horse which is forming out of the Militia, of which the Marquess del Monti is appointed Colonel.
