AT the Council Chamber, Whitehall, the Fourth Day of Augul, 1741.
PRESENT,

Their Excellencies the Lords Justices in

Council. Whereas by an Act of Parliament of the last Session, entituled, "An Act to prohibit for a "Time therein limited, the Exportation of "Corn, Grain, (Rice excepted) Meal, Malt, Flour, Bread, Biscuit, Starch, Beef, Pork, " and Bacon," it is among other Things enacted, That no Corn, Malt, or other the said Provisions, shall be exported out of this King dom, and other the Places therein mentioned, before the 25th of December 1741, under the Penalties thereby inflicted; but subject to such Provisoes and Exceptions as are therein contained. But by the faid Act Power is given to his Majesty, when he shall judge it beneficial to the Kingdom, to permit the Exportation of those Commodities, by his Royal Proclamation to be issued by the Advice of his Privy Council, or by his Majesty's Order in Council to be published in the Gazette, from Time to Time to permit and fuffer all and every Person or Persons, Natives and Foreigners, but not any particular Person or Persons, at any Time or Times before the 25th Day of December, 1741, to export or carry out of this Kingdom of Great Britain or Ireland, or the British Plantations in America, or other the Dominions of the Crown of Great Britain in Europe, or out of all or any of them, all or any of the faid Commodities, in such manner as by the faid Act is directed. And whereas by the Fall of the Price of Barley and Malt, and the Prospect of a plentiful Harvest this Summer, there is great Reason to think that no Inconvenience can happen to the Publick by taking off the said Prohibition, as to Malt; and on the contrary, their Excellencies are of Opinion, that the Liberty of exporting it will be of Benefit to this Kingdom; It is therefore hereby ordered by their Excellencies the Lords Justices, with the Advice of his Majetty's Privy Council, That it shall and may be lawful from henceforth, notwithstanding the said Act, to and for all and every Person and Persons, Natives and Foreigners, to export and carry Malt out of this Kingdom, in the same Manner, and subject to the same Restrictions, Regulations, Terms and Condi ions as they might do, or have done, in Case this Act had not been made, and no otherwise. And the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of his Majesty's Treasury, the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty, and the Lord Warden of the Cinque Ports, are to give the necessary Directions herein as to them may respectively appertain. Neiss, July 25. On the 16th Instant Te Deum was solemnly Sung in this Place and in the Camp at Buhlau, in Thanksgiving and Rejoycing for the Coronation of the Queen

of Hungary: On which Occasion a triple Difcharge was made of the Cannon on our Ramparts, and of the Small Arms of our Garrison, and the like was done in the Army. A Number of Men are daily employed in firengthening the Fortifications of this Place. On the 20th General Count Brown set out Post from hence for Prague. There are srequent Skirmishes between the Prussin Hulfars and ours: But the two Armies continue

quiet in their Camps.

Vienna, July 29. A few Days ago the Danube overflowed large Tracts of Ground in the Neighbourhood of this City, and did great Damage in feveral Parts of the City itfelf; but the River is now funk to its ordinary Channel. This Inundation is attributed to the great Rains which have lately fallen in the Tirolese and in Bavaria, and swelled the Rivers that fall into the Danube. The 26th being the Festival of St. Anne, whose Name the Archdutchess, Sister to the Queen of Hungary, bears, it was celebrated at Court by her Majesty, who came hither from Presbourg, and dined that Day in the Apartment of the fecond Empress Dowager, accompanied by the Grand Duke and Prince Charles of Lorrain; and in the Evening her Majesty went back with them to Presbourg. Several Regiments of Horse and Foot, which have been ordered from Hungary to Bohemia and Upper Austria, are on their March, and some of them have passed by this City.

Admiralty Office, August 7, 1741.
