HE Pope has made three Grants to the King of Portugal, which for a long I'me had been pretfingly follicited by the Portugueze Ministers, viz. the Union of the Parochial and Cathedral Churches of Lisbon, the Erection of a new Seminary, and the Consent of the holy See that the third Part of the Revenues of the Eccleliaffical Benefices in that Kingdom shall be appropriated for the future to the Benefit of the faid Churches. The Pope has ordered Bulls accordingly to be dispatched at the Datary, and at the earnest Instances of Sig. Sampario the present Portugueze Mini ster, has ordered, that instead of 170000 Crowns, the Amount of the Fees of those Bulls, no more than 140000 shall be taken. The Pope has appointed Sig. Biglia to be Superintendant General of the Manufactures of Cloth and Silks in the Ecclesiastical State. Cardinal Tencin in an Audience he had lately of the Pope, obt ined his Permission, that the Bailly de Tencin his Nephew, may, as Ambassadour Extraordinary from the Grand Master of Malta, compliment the Pope on his Accellion to the I ontifical Chair. dinal Lamberg Bishop of Paslau, has sent a Present to the Pope of two Chests of very scarce and valuable Books, with some curious Manuscripts; which the Pope received with great Expressions of Satisfaction, being a Lover of Literature; and the Books and Manuscripts have been delivered to Cardinal Passionei his Librarian. It is currently reported, that the Republick of Venice deligns to have an Army of Observation, consisting of 25000 Men, drawn together and cantoned in the Neighbourhood of Verona, for the Security and Desence of their Territories, in case a new War, which is much apprehended, should break out in Italy. Each Coach had one Flamboy carried before it on Horseback, only Count Harrach's had two. 'I he Corple was in an open Herse, covered with a black Velvet Pall bordered with a Gold Lace, surrounded by fix Pages each carrying a Flamboy. The Procession was closed by a Company of Grenadiers, their Drums beating a dead March. The Cossin was opened in the Church, and the Corpse consigned to the Dean, who gave his Receipt for it in Writing; then it was locked with three different Locks one Key of which has been deferent Locks, one Key of which has been delivered to the Dean, another to the Chan-cellor of Brabant, and the third to the Pre-fident of the Privy Council. His Excellency Count Harrach began to give Audiences Yes terday, as provisional Governor of the Austrian Netherlands.

'Tis advised from all Hague, Sept. 1. Parts, that a confiderable Body of French Troops having pailed the Rhine, is advancing towards Bavaria. Preparations were making at Donawert for their Reception, and they are to encamp between that Place and Hochstedt; where they will wait for the Elector of Bavaria's Orders to pass the Danube, and whither to march alterwards. Another Body of French Troops is also on the March from Givet to enter the Territories of Juliers and Bergue.
