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From Hunday August 4. to Thuistal August 7. 1673.

Esterday arrived here from Rome the Prince de Cariati, where he was in quality of Ambassador Extraordinary on the part of the Crown of Spain, to perform the Ceremony of doing homage on St. Peters day, extreamly satisfied with his reception at that Court, and the Honors ke received of his Holines upon this occasion. We have advice that the 10 French Gallies, who have cruised all along the Coasts of Italy, are arrived at Nista. The great endeavors that have been used by our Viceroy, to rout the Banditi, have at length in a great measure their effect, for of late we have not heard of any mischief they have done, nor indeed of their having appeared any where in any considerable Bodies, Yesterday was a general Muster of all the Spanish Insantry in Garrison here.

Rome, July 22. His Holines hath been this week

past, much better then we have feen him a long while; on Monday last was held a private Consistory, though we know not what was done there; it was scarce ended when a Courier arrived from France with Letters to the Duke d' Estrees, the French Ambassador here, giving him an account of the taking of Maestricht, which his Excellency immediately communicated to his Holiness, and the most eminent persons of this Court, who all returned the Ambassador their Congratulations thereupon, Sigmior Ranucci, Nuncio in Poland, is recalled home, though we hear that King has written to his Holinels, to desire he may be continued at his Court, and Signior Bonvist hath been declared his successor. Signior Nerti, Nuncio in France, having received the Cardinals Cap, isnow returning home, and in the mean time our Superiorsareabout making choice of a fit person to supply his place at that Court; there appear several pretenders for that employment, and as yet we cannot fay who is likeliest to have it. The Duke of Mantoua has been of late extream ill, infomuch, that it was reported here, that he was dead; but our Letters from thence afture us of the contrary, and that he is much recovered, and out of all danger. The Cardinal Orfini has been likewise very much indisposed, but is now pretty well again.

Venice, Fuly 22. The two Gondelo's which are made here for the most Christian King, are now ready to be sent to France by the way of Marseilles, we do not donbt, but that they will be very acceptable to his Majesty, they being the finest that have been made here. We have advice that the Galleys of Maltha have Rencountred near Rhodes, part of the Fleet going from Alexandria, to Gonstantinople, and after a sharp dispute with them, took five Merchant Ships, and two Turkish Galleys. all richly laden, to the value, not reckoning the Ships and their Equippage, of a Million of pieces of eight. From Turkie all our Letters tell us, that the Grand Signior has now declared his resolution of marching with his Forces against Poland, because that Crown resuses to pay the Tribute sipulated by the late Treaty.

Bisel, Fuly 26. The several Cantons being Assembled at Bisen, they have received the Propositions of the Forreign Ministers, who are there on this occasion, but hitherto have returned their answer onely in gene-

ral terms; it is faid, the French Ambassador demands; they should not give passage to any Troops going to the Dutchy of Bergundy.

Genotes, Fuly 26. After all we find his Holiness Mediation with his most Christian Majesty, for the reconciling the differences between his Majesty and this State, hath had the good effect we promifed our felves, the feveral Barks which were taken from us by the French Galleys, are all reflored, and arrived here; but our Galley is as yet detayned at Marfeilles, though we hope to see her likewise here again very suddainly. The Sieur Gaum no the French Minister, is at prelent at Turin, but expected here, who having laboured with a great deal of zeal to bring matters to this accommodation, will without doubt, receive the acknowledgments of the Senate, of the good service he hath rendred them in this affair. It was some time since reported with much confidence, that the Duke d'Offuna Governor of Milan, was recalled from that Government, and that the Prince de Ligne Vice-Roy of Sicily, was to succeed him; at present we hear nothing farther of it and as yet we cannot learn that the Duke a'Offuna makes any preparation for his return

Coblenty, Mugata Great part of the French Forces ye at present in this Electorate, and as may well be of which our Elector hath highly sompathed at the Diet at Rather nne, and received for er, as we are tolde mithe Sieur de Gravelle, residing there on the part of the Crown of France, that his most Christian Majesty was extreamly troubled, that any Prince of the Empire should pretend to receive preju ice by his Forces but that they ought to receive ile b.a.ne, and make satisfaction, who had forced him, for the security of his own affairs, to advance them so far. And besides, here is likewise arrived an Envoye from his most Christian Majesty, to represent the fame to his Electoral Highness, with some farther propositions concerning the present Conjuncture. From Franc fort they write that the 29 past Monsieur de Turenne was advanced within 2 Leagues of that Town and held his Head Quarters at the coming away of these Letters, between Fridberg and Frantfort. That the Elector of Cologne's Troops were expected the 28 at Gifen, from whence they were to advance to joyn with Monfieur de Turenne. ' We hear that the Count de Windilgrat?, hath been difpatched by the Emperor to several Princes of the Empire, to endeavor to perswade them to take part with his Imperial Majesty, but as yet we do not hear of any success he has had in his Negotiation; certain it is, that the Elector of Bavaria omits no endeavors to disswade the Emperor from engaging the whole Empire into a War, which he fays he may do, if he proceeds too far in favor of the Dutch. The Duke of Hanover has declafavor of the Dutch. red his intentions of affilting his most Christian Majefly with 12000 Men, and that he has them already on foot.

Nancy, Aug. 3. The 1 instant his Majesty arrived here with the whole Court, and at present we are very busic about fortifying of this place, which his Majesty intends to make much stronger then ever it was; all the Forces are daily employed in this work; the first party

comes on about four a clock in the morning, and works tillton, and then marches off; at two in the afternoon zomes on the second party and they work till eight at night, so that in a short time we may expect to see the Fortincations all finished. It is faid that Monsieur de Louvey intends to go suddenly for Brifac, and that his Majesty may likewise make a step that way. Our Lettersfrom Germany tell us, that the Imperial Army will in a day or two begin to march from Egra, and that the Emperor will advance with them in person into the Empire as far as Ratishonne, and there keep his Court for some time; in the in erim Monsieur de Turenne bas enlarged his Quarters, till within two Leagues of Francfort, and is endeavouring to secure himself of a Pals on the majne, his intentions being faid to be, to advance into Franconi la soon as he hears the Impe-

rialis are concing down. Bruffelr, lugar o, We cannot yet hear that the Heer van B. ve ning and he Heer van Haren, are gone from the Highe on their return to Cologne, which all peop'e much wonder ar, and can give no other rea-lin for, but that the States enucavor to know the politive Resolutions of their Allies, before they give their Answer to the English and French Ambassadors; We do indeed still stick to this Point, as we have done for many Months rogether, that the Queen of Spain has finally refolved to break with the Crown of France, but whether the States General have at present any better affurances then they have had heretofore, of the intentions of Spain, we know not, however, they endeavor to perswade the people, that the Spanisrds are just upon declaring, though they being wearled with a vain expectation hitherto, begin to be increasious in the point. The Prince of Ornge is at the Higue, but the Army continues where it aid, near Gertrurdenbergh, and the French in the Mayery of the Bofch . In the mean time we are very quiet in these parts, and hardly expect to hear of any conficerable Action, unlefs the coming down of the Imperial Army does occafion it which we are affured, will now in a day or two begin to move from Ezra; The Conjectures concerning the march of these Forces, are very virious still, and fembelieve (those who out of their kindness to the Dutch, would have it so, excepted) that the Emperor will a wance to far, as to come to any Action, which however, it he has intentions to do, it is not to be doubted, but that the French who are prepared to receive his Army, will like ife adv nce to meet them. It is faid here, that the Count d'Eprades Governor of Mzestrieht, has demanded a Contribution of 13000 Ryxdollars of the Dutchy of Limburgh, which our Governor seems to take very ill. The Dutch write, that the Bishop of Munsters Troops, upon the news of the taking of the New-Schins, by the Sieur Raben-baup, removed from Cowerden, which they had Invested on that side, which looks towards Groningen,

Milland, Aug. 7. The Enemies Fleet lies now all along this Coast, the small Frigats coming very near the shoar, have taken several Fishermen, though we hear, they afterwards released them again. The Prince of Orange came yesterday to the Helder, a Village at the Texel, and will, it is faid continue in these parts, till the Enemies Fleet has quitted our Coasts, Hague, Aug. 8. The Sta es having as we told you in

our last, written to Admiral de Ruyter, that it would much reflect upon their reputation to have the Enemies Fleet continue upon their coast, whilst he remained in Sehonevett, and therefore that they thought it fit, he should quit the coast of Zealand, and come towards the Mars, accordingly this morning our Fleet appeared off of Sceveling, about three Leagues in Sea, being counted in all 120 or 130 Sail, where they came to an Ankor, and have ever fince continued. The Prince of Orange was expected here from the Texel

the 6 instant but by reason the Enemies Fleet remains itill on those coatts, his Highness thinks his presence necessary in those parts, for the settling the minds of the People, who are full of apprehensions that the English are about Landing, for the preventing of which, we ruse all possible ondeavor. The Heer Van Beverning and the Heer Van Haren, are now ready for their departure for cologne; they would have fer forwards two or three days fince, but that the great confusion we have been and still are in upon the Enemies Fleet keeping so near us, has given a great stop to all publick bufinels, other then what concerns the fecurity and deence of our Coasts.

H.gue, Augist 11. Our Fleet continues still off of Scaveling, where the Pentionary Faget, with feveral other Lords Deputed by the States have been on Board Lieutenant Admiral de Ruyter, to confuit with him what was to be done, viq. whether the Fleet should move farther to the Northward; to have an eye upon the Enemy, or else return to Schonevelt; what was there concluded, we cannot learn, but upon the fetuan of the faid Pentionary and the Deputies, the States Affembled about ten at night, and so continued till two in the Morning. We shall now soon see the result of the Morning. We stall now foon fee the result of their debates, by the course our Fleet takes; if they resolve to Engage the Enemy, we may soon expect to hear of a Bartle, for the Enemies Fleet lies till before the Texel; this is the reason that the Prince of Orange is not ver returned nor do we know when to expect him. Our Plenipotentiaries are at last gone hence for Cologne.

Rotterdam, Aug. 11. We were here in great ex-pectation to have heard of an Engagement, upon the advice we had, this our Fleet was passed by the Maes to the Northwards; but it feems they went no farther then Secueling, off of which place they have layer fince the 8 instant. The six was resolved to send two Regiments of Foot on Board the Fleet, but that refolution was present'y after changed again. It is reported that our Fleet is ordered to return to Schonezelt, bedause of great disorders that we hear are amongst the people in Zealand, upon their leaving that Coast, though others say; that they will stud Northwards to Fight the Enemy, who lies still off of the Texel. Our Plenipotentiaries are passed through this Toan on the return to Col gne.

Portsmouth, Aug. 2. Yesterday arrived at Spithead the Mermaid Frigat, and the Haston Ketch, with feveral Merchantmen under their Convov from Guerafey, having besides with them two Vessels, which they retook from a Dutch Caper on the 31 past to the East of the Ifle of Portland, the one colled the Expedition of Lime, laden with Sugars rom Artees, and the other a French Veffel laden with Sale from Rochetle; the Caper had 14 Guns and 80 Men, and was cheed for feveral hours by the Frigat, but escaped, the Frigat not being able to pursue her, because of the Ships under her charge.

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
