Naples, September 19, N. S.

ON the 6th Instant the Anniversary of the young Princess, who then entered into the Second Year of her Age, was celebrated at Court with great Solemnity; on which Occasion the Ministers, Nobility, and Military Officers appeared in rich Habits. The Present which the Turkish Ambassador brought from the Grand Signior to his Sicilian Majesty, and presented Yesterday at his publick Audience, is said to consist of, a Tent of Crimson Velvet embroidered with Gold and Pearls, with its Tassels also with Pearls; a Cutlafs worked in the same Manner with a String and Tassel of Pearls; six Horses with their Furniture embroidered with Jewels; six Pair of Pistols and two Muskets richly set with Gold and Jewels; Twenty one Pieces of Persian Brocades with Gold Flowers; three Bales of Carpets; a Quantity of Mecca Balsam; two Elephants, and four Camels; thirty Christian Slaves; a Breast Jewel for the Queen, and a Box which the Queen is desired to open herself, which makes it believed there is something very precious in it. M. Borras, Commodore of the Ships of War St. Phillip and Parthenope, was this Day, by the King's Order, removed from his Post, for not having saluted, when at Constantinople, four French Men of War then at Anchor near the Walls of the Seraglio. The King has appointed in his Room the Knight of Malta Majo, who has already received Orders to prepare the Ship Parthenope, of which he is Commander, to conduct back to Constantinople the Turkish Ambassador; so that it is imagined that Ambassador will set out on his Return to Constantinople about the latter End of this Month. Letters from Rome say, that on the 14th Instant Fifteen of our Deserters were stopt there and conducted to Prison, at the Request of Cardinal Acquaviva, in order to be delivered up, pursuant to the Articles of the Treaty of Accommodation between this Court and that of Rome.

Leghorn, Sept. 29. They write from Tripoly, that M. Logie, the Swedish Minister, has concluded a Treaty of Peace and Commerce with that Regency on the same Footing as the other Christian Powers. The Present which that Minister carried thither consisted of four Gold Watches; whereof two were set with Diamonds, several Pieces of Plate, China and Cloths, thirty Pieces of Iron Cannon, with Ammunition, and a Chest of small Arms. M. Logie is gone to Algiers

to conclude such another Treaty, and has left M. Barég to be the Swedish Consul at Tripoly. On the 27th a Courier arrived here from Milan, by way of Florence, having brought Dispatches to General Walseck, and some Remittances for the Troops.

Florence, Oct. 1. On the 17th past eight Soldiers of the Lorrain Regiment of Foot Guards, deserted: The next Day two of them were taken, one of which was immediately executed, and the other condemned for seven Years to hard Work on the Fortifications of these Castles. On the 24th an extraordinary Council was held by the Regency concerning the Finances, and on the 26th at Night a Cabinet Courier was dispatched to the great Duke with Remonstrances thereupon. M. Lisoni, who for many Years past has resided at this Court with the Character of Imperial Secretary, has obtained Leave to retire. On the 27th M. de Braitwitz, attended by M. Warren, Colonel of the Artillery and chief Engineer, set out from hence for Ferrara del Sole, on the Borders of the Romagna, to review those Passages. On the 28th the Marquess del Monte, Jun. was declared Colonel of the new Regiment of Horse formed out of the Militia; and M. Pandolfini, a Florentine Noblemah, was declared Colonel of the second Regiment of Foot of the said Militia.

Copenhagen, Oct. 3. N. S. The East India Company are preparing to send out two Ships to Canton for their next Venture, having hitherto had but one employed yearly in that Commerce. The Frigate called Christians Oe which was separated from the Iceland Squadron in the Categat, is got into a Port of Norway.

Presbourg, Oct. 4. N. S. The Plague having broke out at Pest, over against Buda, whither the Court intended to go, it is now said that they will go Southward beyond Gratz, if they cannot return with Safety to Vienna.
