Modrid, Aug. 2.

N the thirtieth path, the Ruffia Envoy had his Audience of their Majesties, and will sueedily part hence again, on his way hone. Upon a dispute between the Cardinal of Aragon, as Colonel of the Kings Regiment of Guards, and the Mayor domo Mayor, about certain Privile Iges in the Palace, decided it stems in savor of the latter, his Eminence Lasbeen induced to resign that command.

We hear from Libbonne the 18 past, That four FrenchMen of War were in Harbor there, under the command of Monsieur Chasternaut, which came in the week before from Cruising, and said, they would go out again very speedily. The Genouese Merchants there, apprehensed they came on those Coasts to intercept the Lorreto, a very rich Ship, bound to that Port, though they since find they had not any reason so to do: I hat two days before departed thence three Ships for Angola, one of which carries thither a new Governor, and in their company two other Portuguese Ships bound for Brist: That the Prince and Queen would suddenly remove to the Coldus, and possibly stry there two Moneths.

From Cadia, July 8. That the Centurion Front with feven Sail of Merchants, with Provisions or Tangier, and Goods for that place, were arrived in Twenty two days from Plimouth. That the Tiger Fregat, was likewise arrived at Gibraltur from the Levant.

From the same place the sixteenth past, That three days before, departed thence the Spanish Frosa for New Spain, being in all thirteen Sail, and will be convoyed as far as the Canary Islands, by twelve of their Armada Ships. The Flosa goes exceeding rich, and so deeply laden, as may endanger many of the Ships, should they meet with bad weather; one of them had sunk in the Bay, if not speedily succored by the rest, and was forced to stay behind to put her self in a secure condition, by the unlading 70 Bails of French Linnens, and about sity Pipes of Wine, and the next day proceeded on her voyage. That three of the French Men of War sailed the siteeath for the streights, and served the English Victuallers for Convoy to Tangier. That the Centurion would depart within a day or two. That the Genonese Convoy which has lain some time in Gibraltar, for fear of the French, intended to Sail homeward with the first opportunity.

From Maiaga the eighteenth past, That a Dutch Privatier of nine Guns and seventy Men, was come out of Cadia, and lay off Marvella, a small Fort on those Coasts.

Warsaw, July 25. We seem now ready to enter into a War with the Turks; for after all, it has been resolved, that since the Muscovites offer us their assistance, we should not miss the opportunity, but endeavor to recover what we lost the last Summer. Upon this account we have now absolutely resused to pay the Tribute, agreed by the last Treaty, but are preparing for War; which that the Soldiery may with more chearfulness hear of, the Crown Jewels, valued at Six hundred thousand Livres, have been put into the hands of the Great Marshal Sabietshi, for the satisfying their Aliegis. His Excellency will in a day of two part

hence on his way to Sokal, where the Army is to Rena dezvous; but his Majesty will not stir hence, till he hath received advice from the General of his Arrival, and the disposition he finds things in there.

Vienna, Aug. 3. His Imperial Majesty had resolved yesterday to have begun his journey tor Egra, but was hindred by the high Waters, which we heard were every where abroad; but to morrow his Imperial Majesty will certainly fet forward. It is reported here, that the Electors of Treves, of Saxon, and of Brandenburgh, have promifed to meet the Emperor the fifteenth of this Moneth, at the Rendezvous at Egra, but we, as yet, fee no reat likelihood of it. The Envoy from the Elector, of Bivaria is still here, and is very active in representing to the Ministers, the ill confequences the march of the Imperial Army will certainly have, adding withal, That his Electoral Highness will not fo far contribute toward, the ciffurbing the Peace of the Empire, as to permit these Troops to pass through his Territories \$ which ie therefore prays they may not attempt to uos for that he would bring all the force he could togethers to oppose them in it. The Sieur Hemskerke, Envoy. from the States General of the United Pr vinces is arrived here again in great hast from Hokand, and yesterday hered Audience of the Emperor. All that we can learn of his errand, is, That he extreamly presses the march of the Imperial A. my.

Francfort, Aug. 4. Monsie r de Turenne keeps his quarters still on the Lohn, and though his Forces live in the greatest Order and Discipline possible, yet it cannot be avoided, but the Country must receive some damage by them. The Elector of Fraves hath made his complaint to the Emperor, and the Dyet at Rathebonne, and desired their assistance for the procuring him satisfaction of his most Christian Majely, who has sufficiently declared himself in this point, That it is contrary to his inclination, to keep his Forces in any part of the Empire; and that he would soon remove them, could he do it with security to his own affairs. The Duke of Lorraine resides constantly in this Town; in the interim the march of the Imperial Proops is the subject of all our discourse, and it is much seared, that it may bring the Empire into a War.

Nancy, Aug. 8. Their most Christian Majesties remain still here, and as yet there is no discourse of their removal. The Work of the Fortistations is carried on with so much diligence, that we doubt not but to see them in a short time sinished. Our Troops lie, as yet, dispersed in several quarters, but so soon as we certainly hear, that the Imperial Army is on its march, it is said, his Majesty will likewise bring his Forces together, and form a considerable Army.

Cologne, Aug. 11. Monsieur Odyk is returned from the Bath at Aix la Chapelle to meet his Collegues here; who are hourly expected from the Hague; upon their arrival we shall know what hopes we may entertain of the Peace Monsieur de Turrnne keeps his cheif quarter still at Wetql er, though his Van-Guard is advanced very neur Francfort. The Chevalier de Fourille is quartered with 12000 Horse at Izel, within a League of Treves; in the mean time, the French Forces increase daily, so that Monsieur de Turenne is said to have at present 40000 Men under his command. General

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
