**T**HE large Train of Artillery and military Stores which have been collecting together for some time past, are all ordered to be laid up in the Magazines of the Arsenal.

*Leghorn, Oct. 27, N. S.* The Master of a Swedish Ship, who on the 18th Instant put in at this Port by contrary Winds, in 24 Hours from Marseilles, says, that the Toulon Squadron was failed, but to what Part was not known.

*Florence, Oct. 29, N. S.* The Secretary of State has, by the last Post from Turin, received Notice, that on the 2d Instant Orders from the Court of Spain were sent to Barcelona for the Imbarkation of the Spanish Troops, on an Expedition, under Convoy of the Toulon Squadron already arrived at Barcelona. On the 24th, 70 Boxes of military Stores were sent from hence to Leghorn, by the River Arno, for the Use of the Garrison of that Place.

*Vienna, Oct. 28, N. S.* The Appearance of a Siege vanish here every Day more and more: Yesterday Morning 8000 Bavarians marched from Crems towards Budeweis in Bohemia, and those who were at St. Polten begin to retire towards Ips and Ens, though it is not thought to be their Intention quite to evacuate this Country of Lower Austria, except they are forced to it by Famine, but that their main Design is now to make themselves Masters of the Kingdom of Bohemia. Every body is of Opinion that the Matter must be decided by a Battle in Bohemia, where the Great Duke will put himself at the Head of Count Neuperg's Army, and when join'd to Prince Lobkowitz's separate Body, will have together 40 or 45000 Men. The Queen sent six Days ago the following Rescript to the Commission established here, by her Order, for the Security of the Town.

Her Majesty the Queen, in Consequence of her tender Compassion, takes very much to Heart the great Prejudice that must accrue to the Burghership of Vienna, from a longer Absence of her Court, and as the said Burghership have shewn and demonstrated, in the most sensible Manner, their Faith and Devotion in these dangerous Conjunctions, so her Majesty, in the pre-

sent less apparent Danger of a Siege, would be glad to return again to the Town, and thereby help, as much as possible, to procure to the Merchants the necessary Means of subsisting. Therefore the Commission established by the Court for the Security of the Town, is to consider maturely, whether, when, and with what Precautions her Majesty could, if the Danger of a Siege should quite vanish, at least for the next Month of November, return to her Residence, for the Comfort and Assistance of her most devoted Burghership, and to send thereupon their Opinion at large to Court." The Great Duke will, as is said, set out the 3d of next Month for the Army, which will march the Day after to Morrow for Olmitz.

*Breslau, Oct. 28, N. S.* Prince Leopold of Dessau is marched into Bohemia with a Body of Prussian Troops, consisting of ten Battallions and 30 Squadrons, with an Intention, as is said, to take Winter Quarters there. Immediately upon Count Neuperg's Retreat into Moravia, the King of Prussia marched towards Neiss, and invested it on the 19th Instant, since which time he has been employed in diverting a Branch of the River of that Name, in order to drain the Grounds about the Town, which the Austrians had laid under Water. He has brought a Number of battering Pieces and Mortars from Brieg, and with these has been playing upon the Town for some Days past with Success; so that it must necessarily fall into his Hands in a very short time, there being now no Hopes of Succour. The King has appointed the 8th of November, N. S. for the States of Lower Silesia to do Homage to him, in Person, at Breslau, and a great Number of Gentlemen who had left the Country, are returned here for that Purpose; soon after which the King is to return to Berlin. 'Tis said that his Brother Prince William is to be married to a Sister of the Queen of Prussia's about the Middle of next Month.

*Hubertsbourg, Nov. 5, N. S.* M. d'Éting, the Bavarian Minister at the Court of Rome, having asked the Pope's Benediction on his Electoral Highness's Arms against the Queen of Hungary, his Holiness told him, that neither the Neutrality he was determined to observe with regard to the belligerent catholick Princes, would admit of it, nor was it consistent
