**B**y the last Post a Translation was sent of the Queen of Hungary's Rescript to the Commission of Security established here by her Majesty's Order, wherein that Prince desired to have the Commissioners Opinion, whether, when, and with what Precautions he might return to this Residence and Capital Town? But now it is assured, that the said Commission has been of Opinion, that though there is no Likelihood of a Siege before the Spring, yet the Necessity of finishing all the Works that are begun to make this Town a regular Fortress, and Place of Arms, would hardly suffer the Presence of her Royal Person and her whole Court for some Months; so that it is now taken for granted that the Court will pass the Winter at Presbourg, and take its Resolutions afterwards according to the Events of the Winter Campaign, which is upon the Point to begin very shortly its Operations in Bohemia, where the Great Duke will put himself at the Head of the Queen's Army, and with which it is hoped he will be in a Condition to encounter the French and Bavarians, and even the Saxons, if they should join them, as it cannot but be supposed they will, since M. Bunat, who has resided here for some Time as Envoy of Saxony, is gone to Presbourg to take his Audience of Leave, wherein it is said he declared to the Queen, that his Polish Majesty had found himself reduced to the Indispensable Necessity to join with the Elector of Bavaria by a Treaty signed on the 11th past, N. S. The Queen received that Declaration with that Greatness of Mind and Magnanimity which support that Princess under all the Blows that she has received lately. She presented herself the Saxon Envoy with a Ring of great Value, which she desired him to accept in his private Capacity of a Gentleman, as a Token of Remembrance, and not as a publick Minister. He will set out for Dresden in two or three Days, and it is supposed he will be sent to Francfort to assist at the Election, his Master having created him a Count of the Empire in virtue of his Electoral Highness Dignity as Vicar during the Interregnum. The French and Bavarians are all leaving this Neighbourhood to enter into Bohemia. Our Affairs and Croations are constantly after them, and besides the frequent Advantages, they have over them, contribute vastly to facilitate the Desertion amongst them. The Empress Mother is said to be much out of Order at Gratz.

Vienna, Nov. 4, N. S. According as the French and Bavarians retire from Lower Au-

stria, we receive daily Accounts of the Contributions which they have exacted all over that Country. The Great Duke and Prince Charles set out as this Day from Presbourg for the Army, which will be soon assembled together in Bohemia to the Number of 40000 effective Men at least. Two of our Regiments here, viz. Waldeck and Molk, set out To-morrow, and three complete Battalions of Schulerburg's are in March from Hungary, all destined for Bohemia. His Royal Highness is to join the Army at Znaim, and we flatter ourselves that no Time will be lost in seeking the Enemy; so that our Expectations are considerable.

Copenhagen, Nov. 11, N. S. Two Royal Ordonnances are just published here, both dated the 27th of Octobere. By one of them, the exporting of Swines Flesh, live Swine, Cheese and Tallow, from the Kingdom of Denmark, is forbidden under severe Penalties, till farther Order. By the other, Leave is given for the Importation of all Sorts of Corn, into Denmark (which was prohibited by an Ordonnance of the 16th of September, 1735.) upon paying the usual Duties marked in the Toll Book. A Placard is likewise come out, dated November 2, under the Seal of the Chamber of Finances, in Favour of the Distillers of Copenhagen; which forbids the Importing of Corn, Brandy, (and Aquaviva drawn from thence) into this City, from all Places, either of foreign, or of the Danish Dominion, only the Asiatick, West India, and Guinea Companies, together with the Traders to Finmarck, Ferroe, and Gronland, may, this Prohibition notwithstanding, still bring in as much of those Liquors as they shall re-export, either for the Use of Commerce, or for the Provision of their Ships.

Hague, Nov. 17, N. S. M. H. J. J. Secretary to the late M. Ganslot, has presented Credentials from the Courts of Mannheim and Bonn, in Quality of their Resident here, and expects the like Character from that of Munich. There have been frequent Variations in the Repartition of the Winter Quarters for Marshal Maillebois's Corps: At present it is credibly reported that he has Orders to fix his Head Quarters at Ordingen.
