Petersbourg, Oct. 20. Sunday last being the Czar's Accession to the Throne, the Great Dutchess made Prince Lewis a Present of a very fine Diamond Star and Order of St Andrew. The Turkish Ambassadors was last Night at the Masquerade, and the Persian will be there to Night.

Vienna, Nov. 8, N. S. The Austrian Army, under the Command of his Royal Highness the Great Duke, is expected to be at this Day at Asching and Haling upon the Frontiers of Moravia and Bohemia. The 10,000 Bavarian and French, who passed the Danube under the Command of General Torrings, are turned to the Left over the Mountains, to join the Elector at Budewitz. The 10,000 Prussian Foot, under Prince Leopold, have passed thro' the County of Glatz into Bohemia, and are actually lodged in the County of Koniggratz. It is asured that the King of Prussia has order'd the Revenues of Upper Silecia to be paid to the new Officers whom he has established for that Purpose at Oppelen. On Sunday Morning Count Khevenmuller, the Commander of this Town, received Advice by an Express, that the Empress Mother would not return hither as she intended, but was resolved to pass the Winter at Gratz in Stiria. The Empress Amelia is hourly expected from Neubury to her Convent in the Suburbs of this City. The last Letters from the Queen's Army, which is marching into Bohemia, say, that they were arrived on the 4th Instant at Werniesitz in Moravia. The Town of Neiss capitulated on the 1st Instant; and the Prussian Troops entered Jagerdork and Troppaw immediately after the Queen's Troops had left those Quarters.
