S yet we cannot certainly learn when the Grand Marefchal Sobietski will fet forward of his way to Rubieffum, on the Frontiers of Rufsia, where is appointed the general Rendezvous of the Forces we intend to bring

on foot for this Summers fervice; the reafon of his deferring it fo long, is faid to be, That he defires to fee firft the diffribution made amongft the Officers, of the Moheys, the Jewels of the Crown have been fold for, towards the fatisfying their Arrears. And now it feems we begin again to apprehend that the Turks have an intention to invade us yet this Summer; this hath occafioned a refolution, to make out Army up 30000 tighting Men, and befices, all the Nobility of the Kingdom are fummoned into the Field againft the latter end of this month, to which purpofe the third Proclamation hath beea already made. We have juft now advice, that the Grand Viljer is paffed the Daaube; on his march towards the Ukrain.

Venice, August 5. Here are arrived feveral Vessels from Turkie, and bring all advice, of the great preparations of the Turk, and that the Grand Vizier will now very faddainly put himself in the head of the Ottoman Forces, and march with them towards Poland, with intentions to winter in thut Kingdom, to which he is encouraged, by the intelligence he has, of the bad condition things still are in, in those Countries.

Genords, Aug. 9. The difference between the Crown of France and this State, is now finally reconciled and the feveral Veffels which were taken by their Met of War on these Coafts, reffored. From Rome on last Letters rold us, that an Envoye from the Czar of Moscowy was expected in few days at that Court, and that the Pope had ordered his Reception, should be with the greatest Honours and Respect, that could be given to his Character; and that his Holiness continues in very good health.

Vicana, Aug. 9. His Imperial Majefty, as we rold you in our last, parted from hence the fourth inftant, on his journey to Egra, and lodged that fight at Corneulourg, on the other fide of the Danube, the 5 his Majelty came to Hollebran, the 6 Dined at Pulckba, and Lodged at Hosfrey, the 7 Direct at Frating in Moravia, and Lodged at Zlabniz, in the fame Province, the 8 Dined at Koningfeg, and Lodged at Newhous in Bohemia ; this day his Impe-rial Majefty intended to be at Wefely, the 10 at Tein, the II at Strakonis?, the 12 at Gramberg, the 13 at Pilfen, the 14 at Meis, the 15 at Plana, and the 16 at Egra; The next day is to be the general review of the Imperial Forces, and the 20 or 21 it is faid, they will begin to march. Don Pedro de Ronquillo Envoy Extraordinary from the Crown of Spain, and the Sieur Hemskerke, Envoy from the States General of the United Provinces, are the only Forreign Ministers that have followed the Emperor on this journey. The advices we have from Hungary, - are not very agreeable to us, for they give us an account, that the Rebels continue fill very powerful, and extreamly dillurb those Countries. The Marriage between the Emperor and the Arch-Dutchels of Infpruck, will not, as we are told, be confummated till October next, and preparations are making for ic against that time.

Cologne, Aug. 18. On Wednefcay last their Excellencies the English, French, and Swedish Ambasifador:, with feveral other perfons of Quality, were to take a Divertifement of Hunting at Breuil, where they were afterwards very nobly Treated by Plince Willem of Furstenbergh. Yesterday was a Conference at the Convent of the Carmelites, though the Dutch Ambassadors were not there, the Mediators communitating, as we are rold, rothe English and French Ambashadors, the Answer the Heer van Beverning and the Heer van Haren had brought from their Principals to their Excellencies Propositions; we as yet know not any Particulars, but in general, that the Dutch do not proceed with that fincerity towards the advancing of the Treaty, as they would have the World believe they do. Yesterday the English Ambaffadors entertained those of France, the Bishop of Strafburgh, Prince Willem of Furstembergh , and fcveral other perions of the chiefelt Quality sere in Town, at a very iplendid Dinner. The French Forces under the Command of Monfieur de Turenne, lye quartered all along the Main, till within two Leagues of Francfort; It is faid they will in a day or two pais that River, and march farther up into the Empire, to meet the Imperialist. Several French Troops have lately paffed within few Leagues of this place, on the ir march from the Conquestin the United Provinces, to joyn those Troops which are at present lodged in the Electorate of *Treves*, under the Command of the Che-valier *de Feurilles*; We hear they have posselfed themfelves of a small Town called Pfaltzell near Treves, that their chief Quarters are at Honstein, Baldenau, and Bemcastel, and that two Regiments are lately marched towards schoncok and Sconberg. The 16 of this Month the Emperor was expected at Egra.

Paris Aug. 22. Our last Letters from Nancy tell us, that his most Christian Majesty intended to go and visit Brifac, from whence the Marquis de Louv y lately returned; That the Soldiers work constantly on the Fortifications, and with so much diligence, that before the end of this Month, they hope to see 8 Bastions finlihed, and that place the strongest of any in all those parts; They farther add that those Troops which had been Encamped at Bertolfingen near Fenestrang, have now their Quarters in the County of Bitchs, and that they are about making a way to Philipsbourg, for the more convenient passa, eo fluch Troops, as there may be occasion to fend from time to time, to Reinforce Monsteur de Turennes Army,

Antwerp, Aug. 22, All bur Letters from Amfterdam rell us, that yelterday morning the English and Dutch Fleets were Engaged about five Leagues W1S. W. from the Texel, that the Fight had continued very fharp from eight in the morning till eight at night; but that they had not at the coming away of these Letters any knowledge of the fnecels. Since, the return of the Dutch Pleniporentialies to Cologne, we hear they have differed-

ed an Express to the States, to give them account of fome matters of Moment, relating to the Treaty, which we cannot yet learn to be near any conclusion, though, the generality of the People in Holland, who most teel the burthen of the War and are extreamly impoverified by it, pray for nothing more; the Soldiers too, as we are told, complain very much of their want of their pay, fo that as well the Publick as Private Coffers leem to be exhausted.

Braffels, Aug. 23. On Sunday laft the Court d'Affentar Maistre de Camp General of his Majesties Forces, employed in these Countries, having been to visit the Provinces of Guelderland, Limburgh, Luxemburgh, and Namur, returned hither, and gave our Governor the Count de Monterey, an account of the condition he had found them in 5 This day he parts hence on the fame account for Flanders. From Spa we have advice, that Count Marfin, who hath been there fome time to drink the Waters, is at pretent extream ill, and almost despaired of by his Phyfitians. From Tournay they write, that the Prince of Conde was there the 18 inflant, and that the Troops he brorght with him, had been fent to Garrifon in the feveral Conquered places in Flanders. Our next Letters from Garmany we doubt not, but will bring us an account of the Emperors arrival at Egra 3 fome fay, that the Elector of Saxony, and the Elector of Treves are gone thither to meet his Imperial Majefty, and to confer with him concerning the prefent posture of affairs in the Empire, but this is not certain.

Ous Letters from Franckfort affure us, that Monfieur de Turennes Aimy is very confiderably Reinforced, and in a posture to receive the Imperialis, in cafe they attempt any thing upon them.

Hague, 'Ang. 20. This day arrived here an Express with Letters from our Plenipotentiaries at Cologne ; upon which, the States of Holland were extraordinarily Affembled for feveral hours; we cannot learn what this Express brings, farther then that it gives account of a Conference that had been held there after their arrival. This evening the Prince of Orange parted hence to the Leger, though it is faid, he will in few days be back again here. On Thursday last Don Emanuel de Lyra went hence for Bruffels, and to morrow will . return again with Don Bernardo de Salinas, and then fet forward for Cologne. - We feem here to be very much affured of the good intentions of the Emperor towards us, and perfivade our felves that the march of his Forces will very much change things to our advantage, though most sober People are of another opinion, and fear fome fhort time will difcover that we have raken wrong meafures. Our laft Letters from Nancy told us, that his most Christian Majesty intended to goe to Brifac, to continue there a day or two, and return again,

Amfterdam, Aug. 21. The 17 inflant as we for-merly told you, the Dutch Fleet was at Ankor off of Petten, the next day they got as high as the Haack or Spagniarts Gat near the Texel, the Wind being at West; The 19 they retreated again towards Land-Diep and Petten, and as the fame time the English Fleet were under fayl towards the Texel, having been, as we faid in our lait, off of Hlyland, fo that both Fleets were that day feen from the Helder; The 20 towards the afternoon, the two Fleets came in fight of one another, each endeavoring to get the Wind, which was then N E; the English were to the Northwards, and the Dutch to the Southwards. This Morning early, feveral Guns paffed between the Scouts of both Fleets, the Wind S E; about eight a clock they Engaged very furioully 3 about ten, the Wind came to

the South Weft, and the two Fleets retired, Fighting farther into Sca; As yet we have not any account of what hath happened, but expect it with much impa-Our Heet confifted of above 90 Men of War, tience. befides Firefhips and Tenders.

Amsterdam, Aug. 22, Several Letters are come from our Fleet, giving us an acccount of the Engagement yesterday, though we cannot hear that they ipeak of any advantage on our fide; in general, they fay that the Fight was very fharp, it continuing from eight in the morning till after Sun-fet; that the Enemy had fevoral of their Ships difabled, but that they knew not of any one they had lost; of our Officers are flain Lieutenant Admiral de Liefde, Lieutenant Admiral Sweers, Captain de Gelder, Captain Swerins, and one or two Captains more, with feveral wounded; many of our Ships are much fhattered, though we will not as yet own the lofs of any one; where our Eleet is at prefent, we do not certainly know, but they add in their Letters from thence, that they thank God they are able slill to keep at Sea; In the mean time from the Texel we have advice, that yellerday about noon they could difcern from the Coast five Ships on fire, but that they knew not what they were ; That the Arms of Utrecht is come in extreamly torn, and that the Men have been taken out and fent again to the Fleet ; By our next, we hope to give you a more particular account. We have news of one of our East India Ships being fallen into the Enemies hands.

Whitchall, Aug. 16. The Dutch East India Ship the Papenburgh, which on Sunday iast cafually fell into His Majeflies Fleet, off of the Texel, is come into the River of Thames ; the Dutch on Board her report, that they came from the Indies in Company of five other Ships; that they kept together till they came to St. Helens, (which they supposed to have been in the hands of the Dutch) but that they found the contrary, and 9 or 10 English Ships at Ankor before the place, who prefently loofed, and gave chace to to them, upon which the Dutch feparated, every one making the best of his way. This Ship met with no other Enemy, till she was now taken, and cannot tell what became of the others that were in her company.
