Petersbourg, December 12.

Body of 5 to 6000 Grenadiers, are on their March hither under the Command of Colonel Stuart, the Felt-Marshal Lacy's Son in Law, and are actually at Moscow, if not already on this Side of it. The Princess of Hesse Homberg having been out of Order, her Majesty on the 7th did her the Honour of a Visit, and from thence proceeded to the Barracks of the Preobrezenski Guards, where she treated them in the same Room in which she had affembled them the Night of the 25th past. Her Majesty has bought several Houses in the Neighbourhood of the Court, which she designs for the Quarters of the 141 Grenadiers, who are to be formed into a Corps of Trabants with the Rank of Lieutenants, and their Uniform, which will be magnificent, is ordered. Captain Hopken, who was lately taken Prifoner, arrived here the 9th, and had her Majesty's Leave to appear at Court the next Evening at the Drawing Room and Ball. M. Nepluef, the Privy Counsellor, who went some Time ago Governour to the Ukraine, and upon the late Change was fent for back, is arrived, and appear'd Yesterday at Court with Since the Publication of the late his Order. Order by Beat of Drum, an immense Quantity of Plate and other valuable Effects belong-ing to the five chief Prisoners, have been trans-ported to the House which was fitting up for Mademoiselle Julian Mengden after her Marriage, where the Commission of Confiscations will be kept.

Petersbourg, Dec. 15. A Secretary was sent the 13th to potify to all the Foreign Ministers, that according to her Majesty's new Regulation, the Grand Chancellor Prince Czircaski, and the Privy Counsellor M. Bestuchess, who had been declared Vice Chancellor, were charged with the Care of Foreign Assairs, and that the Ministers upon all Occasions should address themselves to these two. By the same Regulation the Admiral Count Gallowin, and the Master of the Horse Prince Kourakin, are declared Ministers

of Conference, to affift the Great and Vice Chancellors upon extraordinary Occasions, and when specially called in. The Privy Counsellor Brevern remains as before, charged with the foreign Dispatches.

Naples, Dec. 12, N. S. On the 9th Instant two Vessels arrived here from Genoa, with Recruits to compleat the Swiss and other Regiments. On the 11th sailed from this Port the two Ships of War St. Philip and Parthenope, escorting to the Presidii 19 Transports with the large Train of Cannon for Battery, Mortars, Ammunition and Military Stores for the Expedi-

tion to Lombardy.

Rome, Dec. 16, N. S. The Pope has appointed Mess. Fabbretti and Clarelli as Commissaries to prepare the necessary Subsistance for the Passage of the Spanish and Neapolitan Troops through the Ecclesiastical State, who promise to pay ready Money for what they may have Occasion. The March of the above Troops is for the present suspended, and Part of those of Spain are extended to our Confines towards Montalto. Many Deserters of both Armies arrive daily in this City, to prevent the Entrance of which in too great a Number together, several of the City Gates are shut up. On the 11th the Cardinals Tencin, Acquaviva, and M. Tun, had Audiences of the Pope relating to the Commissions they had received from their respective Courts. On the 16th it was reported that M. de Montemar was arrived incognito at Cardinal Acquaviva's Palace on his Journey to Naples.

Leghorn, Dec. 22, N. S. On the 19th Inftant, 200 Men out of Pandolfini's Regiment of Militia, entered into the Garrison of this Place.

Militia, entered into the Garrison of this Place. Florence, Dec. 24, N. S. On the 17th Infant a Courier arrived here from Leghorn to the Spanish Agent, with a Letter from M. de Montemat to the Regency, requiring a Passage for a Column of the Spanish Troops through Tuscany to Lombardy, and the next Day a Council was thereupon held, in Consequence of which, Orders were sent to Mess. Velluti and Mazzone, (both Tuscan Officers) to attend on M. de Montemar as Commissaries to settle with him what

may be necessary. On the 20th the faid Commillaries arrived here; and on the 22d, after they had received the necessary Instructions from the Regency, fet out for Orbitello to attend on M. de Montemar. On the 18th in the Evening the Spanish Agent dispatched a Courier to M. de Montemar, with the Answer he had received from the Regency to his Excellency's Letter; and the Regency dispatched an Express to Leghorn to acquaint General Braitwitz with M. de Montemar's Request, and their Determination. On the 19th a Courier arrived here from Vienna, with Dispatches from the Great Duke to the Regency, as was faid, concerning the Finances; and with Notice of M. de Richecourt's Return to Tuscany to attend Business as formerly. the Evening a Council was thereupon called; and in the Night Sig. Gavi, the Superintendant of the Great Duke's Domains, was, by Order of the Regeney, and Confent of the Court of Rome, taken out of the Church where he had taken Refuge, and, under a strong Guard, conducted to the common Goal. On the 20th a Cabinet Courier was, by the Regency, dispatch'd to the Great Duke, to acquaint his Highness with the Demand of the Pallage for the Spanish Troops through Turcany, as well as the Regen-cy's Answer to M. de Montemar, and at the same time to acquaint his Highness with the Imprisonment of Sig. Gavi. On the 22d the Prince d'Ottajono de Medicis had a private Audience of the Electress Dowager Palatine, and in the Night dispatched his Valet de Chambre to the Court of Naples.

Vienna, Jan. 3, N. S. On Monday the 1st of this Month, two Couriers arrived one after the other, with the agreeable News, that Marthal Khevenhuller had passed the River of Ens, and driven the Enemy from the Town of that Name, and from that of Steyr also. As the French and Bayarians had the said River before them, besides an Intrenchment and a Line drawn between the two Towns abovementioned, Marshal Khevenhuller made a Feint of attacking them on the Side of Mathausen, during which Time M. Mercy dislodged them from Steyr, after having killed and made Prisoners a great Number of them; and at the same time the Town of Ens was taken. The Day after, being the 3 ist of December, a Battallion of French which pretended to make some Resistance on the Banks of the River Ens, was cut to Pieces. Mess. de.Segur and Minucci, who commanded a Body of 10000 French and Bavarians, having retired with Precipitation, Marshal Khevenhuller detached the Hussaster them, who slew and took Prisoners a great Number. The Boors having also taken Arms, cutall they met with to Pieces, and the Marshal is in sull March to give the Enemy Battle. They attempted to fave their heavy Bag-, gage by the Danube, but the greatest Part of it, has been taken by the Hussars, a few of whom have been killed, which is hitherto the only Lois on our Side. From Bohemia we are informed, that four Companies of French Grenadiers were lout to the Sword by the Hungarian Troops put to the Sword by the Hungarian Troops called Portalistes, 300 of the French Horse having run away at the first Onset. This Detachment was advanced to reconnoitre the Great Duke's Army, who took 200 Prisoners at Wodnian. From the Army of M. de Lobeowitz there is Advice, that M. de Chatillon, a French Brigadier is had fallen into the Hands of Caroli's Hussars, who after killing an Hundred of his Men, took him Prisoner himself, with his Son, four other Officers, and an Hundred private Soldiers

Vienna, Jan. 6. The Enemy commanded by M. de Segur, the Prince of Tingry, my Lord Clare, and M. de Minucci, made a Feint at first as if they intended to retreat on the Side of-Wels and Lampach, but they threw themfelves into Lintz, where, together with the Garrison, they make a Body of 10,000 Men, and are so block'd up by Marshal Khevenhuller, that being destitute of Provisions, and cut off from all Affistance on every Side, they have already offered to capitulate, and to evacuate all the Upper Austria, uposi Condition. of having a free Passage, and the military Honours allowed them; but Marshal Khevenhuller Insists, that they shall either furtender themselves Prisoners of War, or engage to serve no more against the Queen during the Continuance of the present War. . General Bernes has seized the great Magazine which the Enemy had at Cromimulister, where he made two Companies of Bavarian Cuirassiers Prisoners of War; and General Bernclau has got Possession of the Salt Works at Gmund, with the Towns of Hallstat and Ischel, and taken Prisoners 400 Men that were its Garrison. Mathausen has a likewise surrendred at Discretion.
