Brusselaug. 26, The Count d' Assentar Maistre de Camp, General of these Countreys, is gone to visit the Province of Flanders. From s pa we have advice of the death of Count Marfin he having been some ting there to drink the Waters. The Prince of Conde hath difperfed the Cavalry which he brought with him from the Mayery of the Bolch, into feveral small Villages belonging to the French, all along the Lis, and

tome in the febanty of Artvis, to refrem them. Detf, Aug. 24. Yesterday in the afternoon came Letters from Lieutenant Admiral de Ruyter and Lieutenane Admital Tromp, part whereof are printed, but not the whole; in which they do not own the loss of any of their Men of War, though it is certain they have lost divers, and many of our Ships are come into the Texel and the hly very much difabled, and particularly the Htrecht, who had 150. Men killed, and Tromps Ship the Golden Lion; fo that though we print Papers here to deceive the People, yet 1 asure you we have got nothing but blows. We are much troubled to hear of one of our East India-Ships being fallen into the Enemies hands.

Amstordam, Aug. 24. We have for these two days been wholly taken up with enquiring after a true account of the late Fight, and hitherto we are not able to get it; the Relations that are in Print are very con fuled, and differ much ; for here is a large Narrative published of the third great Victory obtained at Sea by the Fleet of this State, in which we are told, of 25 Ships that the English have loft in this last Engagement ; in the next place we have Lieutenant Ad-miral de Ruyses, and Lieutenant Admiral Tromps Lettest to the States, but they are moderate, and know onely of one Man of War the Enemy hath loft; but to shele we cannot give any great credit neither, for that it is certain, that as they do not print all what those Admirals wrote, so they print what they did not write. The Province of Hirecht and the Golden Lion having loft all her Mafts, and seven foot water in hold, are bronght into the Texel, and we are told of several others that are fo difabled, that they will bardly be able to keep ar Sea. Abundance of wounded Men have been fent ashoar. Yesterday our Fleet wassfill at Ankor before the Texel.

Amsterdam, Aug. 25. This day the Body of 🗤 Admiral Smaerts, will be Enterred here, which is much maimed both his Legs having been shot off, and his Head all broken in picces. We are about fending fresh Supplies to our Fleet, and we are told, it is intended they shall remain at Sca, till the latter end of the next month, to fecure our Merchant men, which we expect 1.ome' from the East and West. They consinue to fend a great many wounded Men ashoar from the Fleet, and at piefent, upon better information, how things have gone, we begin to leave off talking of a Victory.

Hague, Aug. 25. All the account we can give you of the Fight, is; That it was very tharp, both parties having fought with great fury; what the Enemies lois is, we cannot certainly fay, farther, then that we know feveral of their Ships are difabled, as likewife are on our fide; The 21 inftant came into the Texel, being towed by feveral fmall Veffels the Province of Uirecht, Captain de Fonghe Commander, and Fromps Ship the Golden Lyon, extreamly shattered, having lost all their Mars; The Ships of Captain Brackel, Captain Scher, and Captain de Hasn, and several others are so disabled in their Rigging, Malls, and Hulk, that it is thought they will not be able to keep at Sea. Of our principat Commanders are killed, the Heer de Liefde, Vice-Admiral of the Maes, the Heer Swaerts, Vice-Admi-

ral of Amsterdam, Captain Fihan de Gelder Lieuz tenant Admiral de Rujiers Son-in-law, Captain Swerins, and Captain Wycke; private Soldiers and Seamen, between eight and mine hundred ; amongst others are wounded, Captain de Fonghe, who was fliot in the Eye, and is in danger of his life, and Mr. Andringa, Sccretary to Lieutenant Admiral de Ruyter, Common Men about 1500. Our Fleet lies at present at the West end of the Uly, very near the shoar. Several Seamen come ashoar, tell us, that the Ship Royal Prince, Admiral of the Blew Squadron of the English, was all the morning fo hotly Engaged, that all her Mafts was shot down, and she otherwise very much disabled, which made Tromp and the reft of his Squadron, prefs the harder upon her, but met with fo brave refifiance from her Seconds, and fome other Ships near hery that in fpight of all we could do, they carried her off. The Prince of Orange is at prefent in the Leagure near Gertrudenburgh, and has, as is faid intentions to Attack Bommel or Creveleur. From Hambrough we have advice, of above 100 Sail of Merchant-men that lay in the River Elbe, bound for these Countreys.

Hague \$ Aug. 29. The 26 inftant we had advice from Frie fland , that Scoo French and Munfter Horfe, had forced a Fortrefs in that Province called Beckaf, and plundered one of the richeft Villages in all that Country, and after that, were marched farther, of which notice being given to the Prince of Orange, feven Regiments of Horfe were immediately fent from the Army at Gertrudenbergh, towards that Province. The 27 instant Captain Brackels Ship the Wakende Crach, and the Voorfichtigheyt, were likewife brought into the Texel to be Refitted, and it is faid, that the Ships of Caprain Meppen, Caprain Haen, and 'Captain Schey will also be forced to come in, besides which we hear of feveral other Ships that are very much difabled : Abundance of Carpenters and other Workmen, have been fent to the Fleet, in order to the repairing their damages; In the mean time the wounded Men are still brought ashoar in great numbers, and we are affured, that we have lost more Men in this, then in any former Fight.

Whitehal, Aug. 22, Yesterday we received advice of the arrivatof Captain Munday in the Assiftance, with three other Men of War and a Fireship, five English Eist India Ships, and three Dutch East India Prizes, viz. The Elephant, the Europe, and the Arms of Friefland, which the faid Men of War tookat St. Helenas, after having regained that Island on the 6 of May last; of which a particular Narrative, hath been already made publick.

Tendennis, Ang. 18. The Hunter Frigat hath brought in hi-ther two Flyboats, which it is thought will prove Prizes, though they pretend to be Oftenders.

Hawich, Aug. 23. His Majeffies Fleet, under the Command' of his Highnefs Prince Rapert₂ is come to an Ankor off of this place, to take in Provisions and other Necessaries, being in a very good condition, notwithstanding the late foul weather, not any Ship having received the least damage.
