## A P R O C L A M A T I O N.

**W** H E R E A S His Majesty hath  
signified unto us His Royal Plea-  
sure, That the Parliament of this  
Kingdom, which now stands pro-  
rogued to Tuesday the Twenty Third Day  
of March Instant, be further prorogued to  
Tuesday the Seventeenth Day of August next ;  
We do therefore publish and declare, That the  
said Parliament be, and accordingly the said  
Parliament is, hereby further prorogued to Tues-  
day the Seventeenth Day of August next :  
Whereof the Lords Spiritual and Temporal, and  
the Commons in this present Parliament, are to  
take Notice accordingly.

the Seventeenth Day of March, 1741.

*Viennä, March 21.* The Prussians, after  
passing the Mark at Goding, went only to  
Scalitz, from whence the Hungarian Infantry  
retired, after having been abandoned by the  
Cavalry ; but upon their halting between Sca-  
litz and Hollitz, the Prussians in their Turn  
abandoned Scalitz, without giving themselves  
Time to take away all the Magazine ; so that  
the Hungarians are again in Possession of Scalitz,  
and are thought to be by this Time joined by a  
Part of Cohary's, and by all Lobkowitz's Re-  
giment of Horse from Transylvania. The De-  
tachment from Count Khevenhuller's Army is  
arrived at Budeweis, and some affirm, that the  
Body which was advanced to Waidhoven and  
Hoorn, is returned to Newhaus. In the mean  
while the French are marched in three Columns  
from Piseck ; two of which are supposed to have  
taken the Route of Pilsen, to besiege Egra ; and the

third is marched to Prague, where the French  
are said to be barricading themselves in the Man-  
ner they did at Lintz. Count Khevenhuller  
has given Notice, that he will burn every Ma-  
gazine that he shall hear of to be preparing in  
Suabia, which his Hussars shall look upon as  
collected for the Sake of the French.

*Kellheim, March 24.* Lieutenant-General  
Feldt-marshal Baron Berenclau having, with a  
Body of 3000 Men, passed the Danube at Dec-  
kendorff, proceeded on his March up the River  
with great Expedition, after having passed the  
Regon, the Naab and the Aldmil, which were  
very much swelled by the Melting of the Snow.  
He passed through several Defiles so narrow,  
that One hundred Men might have stopt a whole  
Army ; and notwithstanding the great Number  
of the Enemy that were cantoned thereabouts,  
advanced with so much Bravery, that upon his  
Approach, the Bavarian Troops retired also in  
great Haste from that Place, which had been  
continually fortifying during three Months, and  
was provided with a numerous Garrison, Artil-  
lery, and Ammunition, and fled to get under  
the Cannon of Ingolstadt ; and to facilitate their  
Escape, they broke down the Bridges behind  
them, which were forthwith repaired. We  
found here 125000 Portions of Bread, 8000  
Portions of Oats, and above 2000 Portions of  
Hay and Straw, 1000 Barrels of Powder, and  
other Stores of War. The Enemy abandon-  
ed likewise their Hospital at Koesching, where  
they left 150 Sick-men, who were not in a Con-  
dition to march ; the other Sick-men, who en-  
deavour'd to retire to Ingolstadt, about 500 in  
Number, were found for the most part dead by  
the Way, which occasioned a sad Spectacle.  
The Enemy have encamped at Meilingen near  
Ingolstadt, in the best Manner they could.  
Their Horse were 2200, and their Foot 3000,  
consisting of the Regiments of Preisingen, Mi-  
nuzzi, Moravisky, and Holstein. Most Part of  
the said Cavalry saved themselves in the Bi-  
shoprick of Eichsted. Some thousand Hussars  
are sent in pursuit of them. The Desertion is
