Hugh Armogh, Rob. Jocelyn, C. Hen. Boyle. HEREAS His Majefty hath fignified unto us His Royal Pleafure, That the Parliament of this Kingdom, which now ftands pro-fogued to Tuefday the Twenty Third Day of March Inftant, be further prorogued to Tuefday the Seventeenth Day of August next; We do therefore publish and declare, That the faid Parliament be, and accordingly the faid Parliament is, hereby further prorogued to Tuefe day the Seventeenth Day of August next : Whereof the Lords Spiritual and Temporal, and the Commons in this prefent Parliament, are to take Notice accordingly.

March 21. The Prussians, after Viennā, paffing the Mark at Goding, went only to Scalitz, from whence the Hungarian Infantry retired, after having been abandoned by the Cavalry; but upon their halting between Sca-litz and Hollitz, the Pruflians in their Turn abandoned Scalitz, without giving themfelves Time to take away all the Magazine; fo that the Hungarians are again in Possession of Scalitz, and are thought to be by this Time joined by a Part of Cohary's, and by all Lobkowitz's Re-giment of Horse from Transylvania. The Detachment from Count Khevenhuller's Army is arrived at Budeweiß, and fome affirm, that the Body which was advanced to Waidhoven and Hoorn, is returned to Newhaus. In the mean while the French are marched in three Columns from Pifeck ; two of which are supposed to have

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third is marched to Prague, where the French are faid to be barricading themfelves in the Manner they did at Lintz. Count Khevenhuller has given Notice, that he will burn every Magazine that he shall hear of to be preparing in Suabia, which his Hussar shall look upon as collected for the Sake of the French.

Kellheim, March 24. Lieutenant-General Feldt-marshal Baron Berenclau having, with a Body of 3000 Men, passed the Danube at Dec-kendorff, proceeded on his March up the River, with great Expedition, after having paffed the Regon, the Naab and the Aldmil, which were very much fwelled by the Melting of the Snow. He pafied through feveral Defilés fo narrow, that One hundred Men might have ftopt a whole Army; and notwithstanding the great Number of the Enemy that were cantoned thereabouts, advanced with fo much Bravery, that upon his Approach, the Bavarian Troops retired alfo in great Hafte from that Place, which had been continually fortifying during three Months, and was provided with a numerous Garrifon, Artillery, and Ammunition, and fled to get under the Cannon of Ingolftadt; and to facilitate their Efcape, they broke down the Bridges behind them, which were forthwith repaired. We found here 125000 Portions of Bread, 8000 Portions of Oats, and above 2000 Portions of Hay and Straw, 1000 Barrels of Powder, and other Stores of War. The Enemy abandon-ed likewife their Hofpital at Koefching, where they left 150 Sick-men, who were not in a Condition to march; the other Sick-men, who endeavour'd to retire to Ingolstadt, about 500 in Number, were found for the most part dead by the Way, which occasioned a fad Spectacle. The Enemy have encamped at Meilingen near Ingolftadt, in the best Manner they could. Their Horfe were 2200, and their Foot 3000, confifting of the Regiments of Preifingen, Mi-nuzzi, Moravisky, and Holftein.
