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Rome, Aug. 12.

Ardinal Nerli, late Nuncio in France, is arrived here, though as yet he hath not appeared in publick. The Musco ite Envoye is not yet come to Town, being detained in his journey by some indisposition; In the mean time his Holiness has ordered he shall be received with much kindness, and respect. His Holiness continues in very good health, to the great satisfication of his Relations and the whole Court. We hearthe difference between the French and the State of Genoua, is now quite determined.

Genous, Aug. 23. Here is arrived Sir John Finch, Ambassador from His Majesty of Great Britiain to the Grand Signior; on Thursday last he made his publick Entry, having been received by order of the Schate withall imaginable Honor and Respect; his Excellency, it is said, will part hence again in a day or two, expecting onely the arrival of the Man of War appointed for his Transportation to Constantinople.

Vienna. Aug. 23. His Imperial Majesty having declared his intended Marriage with the Archdutchess of Inspruce; great preparations are making, as well here, as at Gratz in Stivia, for the celebrating it the 15 of October next. On Thursday last parted hence the Prince of Dretrichstem for Egra. From the Court we have advice that the 14 instant his Imperial Majesty arrived at Pitsen, where he continued the next day, being the Feast of the Biessed Virgin; that the 16 his Majesty parted from thence, proposing to be the 18 at Egra. From Poland we have Letters, which tell us of a late Barrel between the Muscovites and the Turks, on the Frontiers of Russia, and that the latter were defeated, having lost several thousand Men, who were killed upon the place; but this will need a confirmation,

Egra, Aug. 22. The 18 instant his Imperial Majesty arrived here, having been received by our Magistrates with all the Solemnity this place is capable of a Triumphal Arch having been erected on this occasion. The Elector of Sizony is likewise here, with the young Prince his Son, the Duke of Sizon Lauenburgh, the Marquis de Culmbach, the Duke of Eggerlergh, and the young Duke of Wirtembergh, with several others of eminent Osiality.

Linstate, Aug. 27: Wednesday last, General Spien, Governor of this place, parted hence with intentions to goe and wait upon the Elector of Beandenburgh, who it is said, will be at Egra to meet the Emperor there. The Regiment of Colonel Goltz; which hath for some time been quartered here; marched out from hence on Thursday sast, to goe into its former quarters in Pomerania. The Bishop of Munster who hath been some time at Swoll, came the 22 instant to Borkelo, after having given order for the Conjunction of his Troops with those of France and the Elector of Cologne, which were to march under the Command of the Sicur Mornes into Friesland, to Attack, as is said, the Quarters of Prince Maurits de Nassau, at Heerenveen.

Coblent?, Aug. 28: The French Troops which have

for some time been quartered here and there in the E-lectorate of Treves, have been all drawn together and marched under the command of the Chevalier de Fourilles towards Treves; some say, that he has Orders to invest that place, though others tell us, that he is to goe and joyn the King in Alsaia. Some People here in Town pretend to have Letters from Egra, which advice them of the breaking up of the Imperial Army thence, so that we may now expect to hear in a short time of some action. The Elector of Saxony is at Egra, with several other Princes of the Empire, to consult with his Imperial Majesty concerning the present posture of assains. The Elector of Bavaria continues very much to oppose the march of the Imperianal lists.

Cologne Aug. 29. The 20 instant we hear the Counted to Conning seck arrived at Ratisbonne from the Elector of Bavaria's Court, and parted thence immediately for Egra to give the Emperor an account of the Success of his Errand, which it is said, was to press his Electoral Highness to declare, how he intends to employ the Forces he has on foot. The 26 instant his most Christian Majesty was expected at Brilae, and from thence intends to pass to Philapsburg, where Monsieur, de Turenne has directions to wait upon his Majesty. Every day seems to give us less hopes then the other, of the Success of the Treaty, the Durch through some strange instruction, shewing themselves more and more obstinate and averse to the Peace, infomuch, that we are told, that the Mediators begin to complain of their Carriage, they having declared, That the Propositions of the two Kings are so just and reasonable, that if a Peace be not concluded. It c'n onely be attributed to the perversencis of the Durch.

Bruges, Aug. 29. In my last I gave you what account we han from Holland of the late Engagement; they will not yet own the loss of any one Man of War, but all our Letters trom Amsterdam and other places assure us, that they have loft a great many Men, and fome Men of War, and that sich great endeavors are used to conceal the truth of things from the People, that it is no wonder they know to talk of nothing but of the Enemies lofes, being in the mean time ignorant that their own are yet greater. The States are using all posfible diligence to reinforce their Fleet with fresh Ships and Men; the latter, it is faid, they have refolved to take out of the Capers of Zealand, which when they come to execute, it is believed, will occasion great disturbance in that Province. We have several reports here concerning the Dutch East India Ships; most apprehend that they are fallen into the Enemies hands, the thoughts of which, occasions a general trouble in Holland now expect every hour to hear of the Imperial Armies being broke up from $E_k ra$, and of their being on their march towards the Rhyne; In the mean time the French put themselves in a good posture to receive them, and as some report, will march to meet them.

Brussels, Sept. 1. From Francs rive have advice; that the French having finished the Brioge which they were making over the Masn near Sglingstadt; have since possessed themselves of that place, which is a Post of great consequence; The Marchal Turenne has put 3000 Men into it; and is making two Forts to secure

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
