Rome, April 28, N. S.

**C**ardinal Borghese having accepted the Dignity of Protector of the German Empire, acquainted the Pope therewith in an Audience. The Cardinal del Giudice has ordered to be taken off from the Arms erected before his Palace, the Imperial Eagle, and has kept only the Austrian Arms and those of the Kingdoms and States possessed by the Queen of Hungary, with those of Medicis and Naples, Sicily and Jerusalem. The Pope being informed that the Spaniards had made considerable Magazines in Ferrara, and guarded them by a Picquet of 50 of their Soldiers, ordered the Cardinal Legate to oblige them to transport forthwith those Provisions some where else, and to drive the Spaniards out of the Town, for which Purpose he gave him Leave to send for a Detachment of the Garrison from Fort Urbain; he has likewise complained to Cardinal Acquaviva of this Breach of Promise, the Spaniards having engaged that none of their Troops should come into the Towns of Rome, Civita Vecchia, Loretto, Ancona, Ferrara, or Boulogne. Part of the Duke de Montemar's Army have taken Possession in the Ferrarese of the Estates of Sanmartina and Diamantina, belonging to the Duke of Modena, and have sent Parties to Ponte de Lago Scuro, and the Neighbourhood, to view the most convenient Passages of the Po. The Austrians on their Side have sent 500 Men and some Horse to Revere, where they are fortifying themselves. On the Side of Boulogne the Spaniards are advanced as far as Castel Bolognese, and it seems to be their Intention to go in a few Days in quest of Count Traun's Army. It is assured that the Duke de Montemar has received the necessary Money to begin the Operations of the Campaign. The Duke of Castropignano has been at Rimini to confer with the Duke de Montemar. There is as yet no Advice of the Neapolitan Troops being on their March, in order to join the Army of the Spanish General.

*Genoa, May 2.* Two Days ago a Courier from Antibes brought Advice, that Don Phillip arrived there the 29th past, and that about 400 Spanish Horse had likewise reach'd that Place, the Remainder, to the Number of 5000, with 10000 Infantry, being expected daily. Yesterday came in a Packet from Barcelona, with Advice, that Orders were come from Court for all the Barks that were there, to proceed directly for Antibes, where the Troops that are marching by Land are to embark. They write from Marseilles, that four Gallies and two Frigates were going for Barbary, to adjust the Differences between the French Court and the Bey of Tunis

and Algiers; that the French Admiral at Toulon had given Liberty to Part of the Seamen to retire to their Families for a few Days, and that the Spaniards were almost refitted, but in great Want of Men, having lost above one Third by Desertion. Private Councils are every Day held here about the Affairs of Corfica, which are said to be in a bad Situation. The Duke of Miranda, Ambassador from the King of Naples, is still here, waiting to compliment Don Phillip on his Arrival in Italy; from whence it is conjectured that he may land in some Port of this Republick. A Vessel is arrived at Leghorn in 48 Hours from Toulon, which brings Advice, that Orders had been given for all the Seamen to return to their respective Ships.

*Olmutz, April 29.* On the 22d in the Evening, the Peasants of Mirau and Miglitz brought to our Army at Oltschan, 19 Prussians whom they made Prisoners. The Peasants being informed that our Army was in the Neighbourhood, surrounded this Detachment, and required them to surrender, but they having made some Opposition, the Peasants killed immediately four upon the Place, and wounded five or six of them, and had certainly killed them all, if some of our Hussars had not come in. These Peasants desired to have 100 Hussars, with whom they were sure they could defend the Road of Leutomschel, so as not one Prussian could pass, and offered at the same time to entertain them at their own Charge. On the 23d we had Intelligence at Oltschan, that the Enemy having been informed of the Approach of the Queen's Army, had abandoned the Town of Olmutz in the Night, in great Confusion, and had retired towards Sternberg, whither they were pursued by a Thousand of our Hussars, some Companies of Grenadiers and Carabineers, and a Thousand Croats. The heavy Artillery from Brinn, which was coming hither, was ordered back. Sixty four Prussian Deserters arrived here in the Afternoon, and in the Evening 80 more came to Olmutz. The 24th, the Hussars who pursued the Enemy, took from them 16 Field Pieces and some Baggage Waggons, and in the Afternoon they carried off four heavy Cannon, and 45 Waggons, after having entirely defeated two Battalions that covered the Baggage. Towards Evening his Serene Highness Prince Charles, followed by some Generals, arrived here. It is past Belief how much the Inhabitants are incensed against the Prussians. Moravia is now free of the Enemy; the Barbarities they have committed there are not to be imagined. It is assured that the King of Prussia is at Chridim in Bohemia, with a Body of 4000 Men. This Afternoon came in here 75 Prussian Deserters. The Provisions found in this

this Town consist in 576 Measures of Wheat, 176 of Rye, 12946 Quintals of Meal, 3260 Portions of Bread, 672 1 half Measures of Barley, 2310 Quintals of Hay, 736 1 half Measures of Oats, 40167 Trusses of Straw, 72 Quintals of Salt, and 89 empty Sacks. The 25th we had an Account, that the Enemy had likewise abandoned Sternberg, the Peasants pursuing them furiously, to be revenged for the Damages they have suffered by them. Deserters arrive here 20 or 30 at a Time, and assure that half of the Enemy's Army will desert on this Occasion; but most of those who fall into the Hands of the Peasants are killed. It is assured that a Garrison of 3000 Men will be left in this Town under the Command of General Roth, who is to fortify the same, and that the greatest Part of the Army will return to Bohemia. The same Day we had an Account, that General Nadasty was got into Sternberg, and had found there 200 Quintals of Meal, 2500 Quintals of Oats and Straw, 470 Measures of Rye, 440 Measures of Barley, and 660 Measures of Oats. The Cannon taken from the Enemy in different Places, consist in 32 Brass or Iron Guns, and 17 Waggon of Powder and Ammunition. The 26th, Forty more Deserters arrived. Our Companies of Grenadiers and Carabineers are ordered to come back; but the Hungarians and Croats are still pursuing the Enemy. A Prussian Captain and a Lieutenant were brought in to Day. The 27th, 30 Deserters more came to the Army. The 28th our Army marched, and began to file off in Columns; the General Quarters is to Day at Profnitz. Our Hussars have brought in five Officers and 129 Subalterns and Soldiers, whom they made Prisoners. What remained of the Body of Prussians, are cantoned between Troppau and Jagerudorf. The Peasants and Hussars who accompanied them, divided between them the Booty they had taken.

*Vienna, May 2.* Prince Charles is supposed to have been to the Right of Brinn as Yesterday, in his March towards Bohemia. To be able to put the greater Force into the Field, all the Hungarian Foot of the Insurrection will be placed in the respective Garrison Towns of Moravia, the two Austrias and Bavaria. A proper Body of Observation is left in the Passes and Borders of Upper Silesia, Moravia and Hungary. Prince Charles is expected here from the Army this Evening or To-morrow Morning, to stay 12 or 15 Hours only. Count Cowenzel sets out To-morrow as Minister to several Courts and Circles of the Empire.

*Marseilles, May 2.* Don Phillip departed the 26th past from Toulon, and it was supposed he would lie the 29th or 30th at Antibes. The next Day, the 27th in the Morning, Toulon was alarmed from the Signal House, by a Fire and 28 Signals, occasioned by the Appearance of a Squadron of English Men of War, which in the Afternoon advanced within a League of that Place, so that it was easily descried; and three Ships were observed to come as far as the Frecrics, two large Rocks within Sight of Toulon, and from whence the Town and Road lie open. Upon this News all the Seamen who had Leave

to lie on Shore, were ordered to return on board their respective Ships, and every Body were ordered to their Posts, and Detachments of Soldiers were sent in the Night to the Batteries and Fortifications along the Coast. The 29th in the Evening the Signal House here gave the same Alarm.

*Dresden, May 9, N. S.* The Saxons were no sooner arrived in the Circle of Leuthmeritz, than M. Sechelle let them know that they must not stay in Bohemia, and shewed for his Authority a Rescript to the same Purpose, signed by the Emperor. Whereupon this Ministry dispatched a Courier the 5th Instant to Francfort. It is generally supposed that Prince Dieterich has been defeated in his Retreat from Olmutz. It is likewise reported from Prague, that a Detachment of about 30 French has been driven from a Post on the Jasawa, and that the Austrians, pursuing their Advantage, have taken Fischielj, where their Enemies had formed a Magazine. The French here say that their Succour from Prague came Time enough to save the Magazine, and repulsed the Austrians. The Epidemical Distemper still rages in Bohemia; Lieutenant General Polastrone died of it last Week, an Officer much esteemed in the French Army.

*Hambourg, May 11.* A Letter from Stockholm of the 1st Instant N. S. mentions, that a Committee was appointed to examine into the Accusations which were brought against Colonel Logerkrantz; that the several Members had taken their Oath accordingly, and that the Affair which was variously talk'd of, and with great Uncertainty, was conducted with the utmost Secrecy.

*Hague, May 15, N. S.* The last Letters from Bavaria bring an Account, that the Austrians who had evacuated Munich the 29th past, have again taken Possession of that Place under the Command of General Berenclau, after a very short Resistance on the Part of the Burghers. We hear from Dresden, that the King of Poland set out for Fraustadt the 10th Instant N. S. and is expected back the 19th, when it is thought Marshal Bellisle will be likewise there.

*Kensington, May 6.*

This Day M. le Baron de Haflang, Envoy Extraordinary and Plenipotentiary from the Emperor, had a private Audience of his Royal Highness the Duke, in his Apartment.

And afterwards a private Audience of their Royal Highnesses the Princesses Amelia, Caroline, and Louisa, in their Apartment; to both which he was introduced by Sir Clement Cottrell Dormer, Knt. Master of the Ceremonies.
