MANIFESTO. Y the Grace of God, We Elifabeth, Emprefs and Sovereign of all the Ruffias, &c. make known by thefe Prefents to all and every one, but particularly to the States and Inhabitants of the Dutchy of Finland.

It cannot but be fufficiently known to all the Word, and even to those Swedish Subjects themfelves who are not abfolutely determined to admit of no found Reflexion, after what unjust Manner a War against the Russian Empire has been premeditated for some Years past on the Part of the Crown of Sweden, which at last broke out, and was actually begun. Recapitulations on this Subject would be for much the more superfluous, as the Progress of the War of it felf, and the Bleffings which the Almighty has vouch fafed to the Russian Arms, ever fince its first Beginning, have sufficiently manifested, that God never feconds unjust Attempts, but in Differences and Disputes unjustly begun, always affirts the injured Party with his powerful Hand and Help.

At our Accellion to our Hereditary Paternal Thronc, being filled with a fincere Defire of living ut Peace and Friendship with our Neighbours, and of procuring to our Subjects, by ftrengthening the Tranquility of our Empire both at Home and Abroad, a flourishing State and lafting Welfare; as alfo at the fame time, out of that particular Good-will which we always bore to the neighbouring Kingdom of Sweden and its Subjects; we faw with no fmall Concern the Continuance of this War, and the Ruin and Bloodfhed thence accruing to the Subjects on both Sides, and confequently have not neglected, on our Part, any poffible Ways and Means we could employ, for putting an End to the Flame of War, and fuch useles Hostilities, as must difpleafe God Almighty, and for fettling, by the Re-eftablishment of Peace, the former neighbourly Friendship and publick Security upon a lasting and fure Foundation.

We have not been wanting in any Point to give the clearest Proofs of our fincere Intentions and ready Disposition ; we suspended for a confiderable Time the Operations of War, even in the Midst of the prosperous Progress of our Arms, and in vain waited four Months for fome Propofals of Peace expected on the Part of Sweden; mean time we caufed the Swedifh Subjects on all Occasions to meet with all Sort of friendly Ufage, and fincerely contributed, on our Part, to whatever was possible for promoting the Re-establishment of Peace, in Hopes that our peaceable Conduct would work in the Crown of Sweden a reciprocal good Disposition, and that confequently, by a mutual Concurrence, and fincere Refolution, the farther fpreading of fo ruinous an Evil, the Defolation of innocent Countries and Subjects, and all other Calamities attending a ; War, might be in Time prevented, and a Peace pleafing to the Almighty be brought to a happy Conclusion.

In this our favourable Difpofition we were the more confirmed, as we were not unacquainted, that this unjust War was begun, not at the general Defire and unanimous Confent of all the States and Subjects of the Kingdom of Sweden, but that no fmall Number of them had been of quite different Sentiments, who juftly reflecting on the dangerous and pernicious Confequences of a War, begun in an unjuft Manner, all along detefted the iniquitous Steps and Enterprizes of those Perfons, who did not fcruple to facrifice, in an unjustifiable Manner, the publick Weal of their Country to their own private Views and mercenary Paffions: And whereas the Inhabitants of the Dutchy of Finland may be naturally fuppofed to be of that Number, and have the greater Reafon for withing a speedy Determination of this War, as they and their Estates and Poffeffions were first exposed to the Calamities of it, and were forced, though innocent, to undergo fuch Ruin and Devastation : And whereas we, out of a Christian Compassion and Magnanimity, do take these their Sufferings to Heart, and fo much the rather, as in purfuance of our aforefaid peaceable Disposition, we are far from any Views of extending our Power, or making new Conquests, or ever defiring to obtain from Sweden the least Thing, except the Maintenance of Friendship and good Neighbourhood; For these Reasons, at a Time when, contrary to our Inclination, this ruinous War and Effusion of Blood must be carried on, seeing our well-meaning Difpolition for Peace has not yet been able to produce the wished-for Effect, but we have found our felves neceffitated to caufe our Forces anew to penetrate into Finland, we have found good and neceflary, by this our prefent Declaration and Manifesto, to make known to the States and Inhabitants of the Dutchy of Finland, our forefaid favourable Intentions, and that our Forces have not entred their Country with an Intent of taking Possession or making a Conquest of it; affuring all and every one of them in the strongest Manner, after having kindly represented to them their own Good and that of their Country, that if during this War they keep still and quiet, taking no Part in the military Operations or Enterprizes thereto belonging, nor fuffering themfelves to be employed in Hoftilities against us and our Forces, or in any Ways affifting the Swedifh Army, but rather by real Proofs teftifying their Intention of living with us in neighbourly Friendship and Peace; then on our Part, not only no Manner of Prejudice shall be offered to the faid States and Inhabitants, but every one shall be left quietly, and without any Vexation, in the full Enjoyment of his Estates and Postellions, and they shall in all Respects enjoy our Protection and Defence in relation thereto. But moreover, we will, according to our fincere Intentions of not appropriating to our felves the leaft Spot of Ground of another's Territories, very willingly confent, and in all ways whatfoever contribute to the faid Dutchy of Finland's remaining (if they intend to fhake off their Subjection to Sweden, to the End that they may not for

ior the future, as it happens now, by the mercenary Views of a few Perfons, fee themfelves exposed to the Danger and Calamities of a reinous War) a free State independent on either Party, under a Form of Government of their own, to be by themfelves established on such a Foundation, and with all fuch Rights, Privileges and Immunities, as may beft tend to their own Good, and to its everlaiting Settlement, according to their own Defire and Wifhes: In which Cafe, we will be ready to affift them on all neceffary Occafions, with as many of our Forces, and at fuch Times as they shall themselves defire, for the maintaining and supporting their new Establish-ment, and to second them with Readiness and Favour in all their other Defires, concerning which they fhall find it neceflary to apply to us for the better and fecurer Advancement of this Defign.

Aiter this Manner and by this Means, Finland, when it shall find itself upon the aforefaid Establifhment, and under a Form of Government of its own, may ferve for a Barrier and Separation between Russia and Sweden, and also by these fame Means, the Swedes will be freed of all those Cares and Uneafinefles which they have fhewn at the close Neighbourhood of the Ruffian Empire; confequently this Propofal, founded on Equity, cannot be difagreeable to that Crown, if the has a true Inclination to maintain for the future a firm Friendship with Ruffia: As for the reft, we are always ready on our Part to fecure to the States of Finland the unalterable Maintenance and Accomplishment of our gracious Promife made above, by the most solemn Assurances, and the most effectual Proofs, according to their own Defire. But in cafe the Inhabitants of Finland, fhould, contrary to Expectation, reject this our good Disposition and well-meaning Intention, and on the contrary, out of an ill-timed Obstinacy, should suffer themfelves to be employed, during the Continuance of this War, in hoftile Enterprizes against us and our Forces, or give any Affiftance to the Swedifh Army; we fhall find ourfelves obliged, contrary to our own Will and Inclination, to caufe the faid Country to be laid Wafte with Fire and Sword: All which we have ordered to be published by the present Manifesto for due Notice and univerfal Information.

#### From the General Quarters at Mederitz in Moravia, April 30, 1742.

THE 26th and 27th, the Army halted at Olfchan, where fome new Difpositions were made. The Defertion still continues amongst the Prussians, who come in by 30 and 40 to our Camp.

The 28th the Army marched again and flaid at Profinitz.

The 29th the General Quarters was at Wifchau.

The 30th the Army halted. This Morning the Huffars brought in 130 Prifoners from Hoff near Troppau in Silefia; they had alfo taken 20 Waggons laden with Booty from the Enemy. These Prifoners fay that our Troops must have taken a confiderable Booty in Money; and affure that the most Part of their Rear Guard was deftroyed, and that in general they had fuffered a great Loss, as well in the feveral Skirmishes that happened in different Places, as by

Defertion, which was very confiderable. Prince Charles has put all the Inhabitants of this Margraviate under Arms, who in Conjunction with Part of our Troops, are to guard all the Pafles, to fecure this Country from any further Invåfion of the Enemy. The Troops which Prince Charles has ordered for this Purpofe confift in 16000 Men, and 'tis hoped that thefe, with the Inhabitants, will be fufficient to keep the Enemy in Awe.

The 1ft of May the Army marched in Columns, whereof fome went to Aufterlitz, and the other to Czerrcahora and in the Neighbourhood, and this Day the General Quarters was at Aufterlitz; where we had an Account that the Caftle of Glatz had furrendered to the Enemy, the Garrifon having march'd out Drums beating, and Colours flying, with three Field Pieces.

The 2d the Army advanced to Medritz where was the General Quarters, from whence Prince Charles fet out for Vienna, and will return hither in a few Days.

Stockholm, May 4. His Excellency Count Horn, late Prefident of the Chancery, who refign'd his Employment in the Year 1738, and has fance liv'd retir'd upon his Eftate at Eckbyholm, died there the 29th of last Month, aged 78 Years.

Vienna, May 9, N. S. Prince Charles fet out laft Night, and will be this Evening at Saar with the Army. The Pruflians who were ftill hovering about the Frontiers of Bohemia and Moravia, have all difappeared upon the coming up of General Nadafty with his Huflars. Drefden, May 13. The King of Poland fet

Drefden, May 13. The King of Poland fet out the 10th Inftant for Fraustadt, and intended to be back here by To-morrow Seven-night; the French, Swedish, Russian, Dutch, Prussian, Sardinian and Papal Ministers, attend his Majesty on this Journey.

Slefwick, May 14. The King of Denmark and the Royal Family arrived in good Health at Gottorp on the 8th late in the Evening. On the 10th his Majefty reviewed the Cuiraffiers of Kalkreuter, together with Folkersahm's Re-giment of Foot. The 11th in the Morning a Council was held, and in the Afternoon a Battallion of la Potterie's Marines, and a Battallion of Land Milice were exercised before his Majefty and passed in Review. And it was gene-rally observed that the latter, tho' drawn toge-ther but for the second Time fince their Erection, made almost as good an Appearance, and shewed the fame Exactness, Attention and Dexterity as the regular Troops. At this Review Major General Folkerfahm, whofe Regiment is to continue in Holftein, and to be replaced at Copenhagen by that of Dombroich, was made Governour of Gluckstadt in the room of Lieute-nant General Juel, deceased. The Guards and Grenadiers, which were review'd the 8th at Flensburg, have Orders to begin their March towards the Isle of Zealand on the 16th. Their Majefties propole to remove to Rendsburg after To-morrow.

Dre/den, May 16, N. S. There are Advices here which mention, that the Corps of Pruffians which retreated out of Moravia into Silefia, being purfued by the Auftrian Huffars, had loft moft of its Baggage, and upwards of 2000 Men. It is reported that Prince Charles is on full March in Bohemia, and that his Avant Guard has driven two Battallions of Pruffians from Schufchlitz, near Kuttenbourg. The Caftle

the of Frauenberg near Budeweiß, where the French have a Garrison of 4 or 500 Men, is again invefted by the Austrians, and in great Danger of being forced to furrender. The Corps of Hungarians in Upper Silefia daily increases, and they have lately taken a Pruffian Lieutenant with 50 Men; and a Party of them has appeared near Neifs. It is written from Prague, that the Emperor was expected there the 28th of this Month, in order to be crown'd a few Days afterwards King of Bohemia: But from Francfort we hear, that his Imperial Majefty is again confin'd to his Bed by the Gout.

Oftend, May 21. On the 19th Inftant, ar-rived here Major General Howard, Brigadier General Pulteney, Colonel Duroure, and Colonel Peers; and the Transports, with the English Regiments on board, came into the Harbour this Afternoon, but too late to land. Billanders are ordered to receive the Men on board To-morrow Morning, and to fail with them directly up to Bruges.

#### Whitehall, May 15.

His Majefty's Sloop the Hound, commanded by Captain Cooper, being on a Cruize in the Soundings, gave Chace to a Snow on the 29th of last Month, Eleven Leagues to the Westward of Ushant, and came up with her the next Morning, when the hoifted Spanish Colours, and after a fhort Engagement ftruck, and Captain Cooper has brought her into Plymouth. She was a Spanish Privateer, called the Nuestra Senora del Pilar, commanded by Manuel del Cafal, and had 81 Men, and mounted eight Carriage and 14 Swivel Guns, all which, except five of the Swivels, were thrown over-board during the Chace. She came from Bilboa, and had been but 12 Days off the Stocks, and was intended to cruize in the Channel.
