MANIFESTO.

BY the Grace of God, We Elisabeth, Empress and Sovereign of all the Russias, &c. make known by these Presents to all and every one, but particularly to the States and Inhabitants of the Duchy of Finland.

It cannot but be sufficiently known to all the World, and even to those Swedish Subjects themselves who are not absolutely determined to admit of no sound Reflexion, after what unjust Manner a War against the Russian Empire has been premeditated for some Years past on the Part of the Crown of Sweden, which at last broke out, and was actually begun. Recapitulations on this Subject would be so much the more superfluous, as the Progress of the War of it self, and the Blessings which the Almighty has vouchsafed to the Russian Arms, ever since its first Beginning, have sufficiently manifested, that God never secondes unjust Attempts, but in Differences and Disputes unjustly begun, always assists the injured Party with his powerful Hand and Help.

At our Accession to our Hereditary Paternal Throne, being filled with a sincere Desire of living in Peace and Friendship with our Neighbours, and of procuring to our Subjects, by strengthening the Tranquility of our Empire both at Home and Abroad, a flourishing State and lasting Welfare; as also at the same time, out of that particular Good-will which we always bore to the neighbouring Kingdom of Sweden and its Subjects; we saw with no small Concern the Continuance of this War, and the Ruin and Bloodshed thence accruing to the Subjects on both Sides, and consequently have not neglected, on our Part, any possible Ways and Means we could employ, for putting an End to the Flame of War, and such useless Hostilities, as must displease God Almighty, and for settling, by the Re-establishment of Peace, the former neighbourly Friendship and publick Security upon a lasting and sure Foundation.

We have not been wanting in any Point to give the clearest Proofs of our sincere Intentions and ready Disposition; we suspended for a considerable Time the Operations of War, even in the Midst of the prosperous Progress of our Arms, and in vain waited four Months for some Proposals of Peace expected on the Part of Sweden; mean time we caused the Swedish Subjects on all Occasions to meet with all Sort of friendly Usage, and sincerely contributed, on our Part, to whatever was possible for promoting the Re-establishment of Peace, in Hopes that our peaceable Conduct would work in the Crown of Sweden a reciprocal good Disposition, and that consequently, by a mutual Concurrence, and sincere Resolution, the farther spreading of so ruinous an Evil, the Desolation of innocent Countries and Subjects, and all other Calamities attending a War, might be in Time prevented, and a Peace pleasing to the Almighty be brought to a happy Conclusion.

In this our favourable Disposition we were the more confirmed, as we were not unacquainted, that this unjust War was begun, not at the general Desire and unanimous Consent of all the States and Subjects of the Kingdom of Sweden, but that no small Number of them had been of quite different Sentiments, who justly reflecting on the dangerous and pernicious Consequences of a War, begun in an unjust Manner, all along detested the iniquitous Steps and Enterprizes of those Persons, who did not scruple to sacrifice, in an unjustifiable Manner, the publick Weal of their Country to their own private Views and mercenary Passions: And whereas the Inhabitants of the Duchy of Finland may be naturally supposed to be of that Number, and have the greater Reason for wishing a speedy Determination of this War, as they and their Estates and Possessions were first exposed to the Calamities of it, and were forced, though innocent, to undergo such Ruin and Devastation: And whereas we, out of a Christian Compassion and Magnanimity, do take these their Sufferings to Heart, and so much the rather, as in pursuance of our aforesaid peaceable Disposition, we are far from any Views of extending our Power, or making new Conquests, or ever desiring to obtain from Sweden the least Thing, except the Maintenance of Friendship and good Neighbourhood; For these Reasons, at a Time when, contrary to our Inclination, this ruinous War and Effusion of Blood must be carried on, seeing our well-meaning Disposition for Peace has not yet been able to produce the wished-for Effect, but we have found our selves necessitated to cause our Forces anew to penetrate into Finland, we have found good and necessary, by this our present Declaration and Manifesto, to make known to the States and Inhabitants of the Duchy of Finland, our foresaid favourable Intentions, and that our Forces have not entered their Country with an Intent of taking Possession or making a Conquest of it; assuring all and every one of them in the strongest Manner, after having kindly represented to them their own Good and that of their Country, that if during this War they keep still and quiet, taking no Part in the military Operations or Enterprizes thereto belonging, nor suffering themselves to be employed in Hostilities against us and our Forces, or in any Ways assisting the Swedish Army, but rather by real Proofs testifying their Intention of living with us in neighbourly Friendship and Peace; then on our Part, not only no Manner of Prejudice shall be offered to the said States and Inhabitants, but every one shall be left quietly, and without any Vexation, in the full Enjoyment of his Estates and Possessions, and they shall in all Respects enjoy our Protection and Defence in relation thereto. But moreover, we will, according to our sincere Intentions of not appropriating to our selves the least Spot of Ground of another's Territories, very willingly consent, and in all ways whatsoever contribute to the said Duchy of Finland's remaining (if they intend to shake off their Subjection to Sweden, to the End that they may not



for the future, as it happens now, by the mercenary Views of a few Persons, see themselves exposed to the Danger and Calamities of a ruinous War) a free State independent on either Party, under a Form of Government of their own, to be by themselves established on such a Foundation, and with all such Rights, Privileges and Immunities, as may best tend to their own Good, and to its everlasting Settlement, according to their own Desire and Wishes: In which Case, we will be ready to assist them on all necessary Occasions, with as many of our Forces, and at such Times as they shall themselves desire, for the maintaining and supporting their new Establishment, and to second them with Readiness and Favour in all their other Desires, concerning which they shall find it necessary to apply to us for the better and securer Advancement of this Design.

After this Manner and by this Means, Finland, when it shall find itself upon the aforesaid Establishment, and under a Form of Government of its own, may serve for a Barrier and Separation between Russia and Sweden, and also by these same Means, the Swedes will be freed of all those Cares and Uneasinesses which they have shewn at the close Neighbourhood of the Russian Empire; consequently this Proposal, founded on Equity, cannot be disagreeable to that Crown, if she has a true Inclination to maintain for the future a firm Friendship with Russia: As for the rest, we are always ready on our Part to secure to the States of Finland the unalterable Maintenance and Accomplishment of our gracious Promise made above, by the most solemn Assurances, and the most effectual Proofs, according to their own Desire. But in case the Inhabitants of Finland, should, contrary to Expectation, reject this our good Disposition and well-meaning Intention, and on the contrary, out of an ill-timed Obstinacy, should suffer themselves to be employed, during the Continuance of this War, in hostile Enterprizes against us and our Forces, or give any Assistance to the Swedish Army; we shall find ourselves obliged, contrary to our own Will and Inclination, to cause the said Country to be laid Waste with Fire and Sword: All which we have ordered to be published by the present Manifesto for due Notice and universal Information.

From the General Quarters at Mederitz in Moravia, April 30, 1742.

THE 26th and 27th, the Army halted at Oltschan, where some new Dispositions were made. The Desertion still continues amongst the Prussians, who come in by 30 and 40 to our Camp.

The 28th the Army marched again and staid at Prosnitz.

The 29th the General Quarters was at Wischau.

The 30th the Army halted. This Morning the Hussars brought in 130 Prisoners from Hoff near Troppau in Silesia; they had also taken 20 Waggons laden with Booty from the Enemy. These Prisoners say that our Troops must have taken a considerable Booty in Money, and assure that the most Part of their Rear Guard was destroyed, and that in general they had suffered a great Loss, as well in the several Skirmishes that happened in different Places, as by

Desertion, which was very considerable. Prince Charles has put all the Inhabitants of this Margraviate under Arms, who in Conjunction with Part of our Troops, are to guard all the Passes, to secure this Country from any further Invasion of the Enemy. The Troops which Prince Charles has ordered for this Purpose consist in 16000 Men, and 'tis hoped that these, with the Inhabitants, will be sufficient to keep the Enemy in Awe.

The 1st of May the Army marched in Columns, whereof some went to Austerlitz, and the other to Czerrcahora and in the Neighbourhood, and this Day the General Quarters was at Austerlitz; where we had an Account that the Castle of Glatz had surrendered to the Enemy, the Garrison having march'd out Drums beating, and Colours flying, with three Field Pieces.

The 2d the Army advanced to Medritz where was the General Quarters, from whence Prince Charles set out for Vienna, and will return hither in a few Days.

Stockholm, May 4. His Excellency Count Horn, late President of the Chancery, who resign'd his Employment in the Year 1738, and has since liv'd retir'd upon his Estate at Eckbyholm, died there the 29th of last Month, aged 78 Years.

Vienna, May 9, N. S. Prince Charles set out last Night, and will be this Evening at Saar with the Army. The Prussians who were still hovering about the Frontiers of Bohemia and Moravia, have all disappeared upon the coming up of General Nadafty with his Hussars.

Dresden, May 13. The King of Poland set out the 10th Instant for Fraustadt, and intended to be back here by To-morrow Seven-night; the French, Swedish, Russian, Dutch, Prussian, Sardinian and Papal Ministers, attend his Majesty on this Journey.

Sleswick, May 14. The King of Denmark and the Royal Family arrived in good Health at Gottorp on the 8th late in the Evening. On the 10th his Majesty reviewed the Cuirassiers of Kalkreuter, together with Folkerfahm's Regiment of Foot. The 11th in the Morning a Council was held, and in the Afternoon a Battalion of la Potterie's Marines, and a Battalion of Land Milice were exercised before his Majesty and passed in Review. And it was generally observed that the latter, tho' drawn together but for the second Time since their Erection, made almost as good an Appearance, and shewed the same Exactness, Attention and Dexterity as the regular Troops. At this Review Major General Folkerfahm, whose Regiment is to continue in Holstein, and to be replaced at Copenhagen by that of Dombroich, was made Governour of Gluckstadt in the room of Lieutenant General Juel, deceased. The Guards and Grenadiers, which were review'd the 8th at Flensburg, have Orders to begin their March towards the Isle of Zealand on the 16th. Their Majesties propose to remove to Rendsburg after To-morrow.

Dresden, May 16, N. S. There are Advices here which mention, that the Corps of Prussians which retreated out of Moravia into Silesia, being pursued by the Austrian Hussars, had lost most of its Baggage, and upwards of 2000 Men. It is reported that Prince Charles is on full March in Bohemia, and that his Avant Guard has driven two Battallions of Prussians from Schuschlitz, near Kuttentourg. The Cas-

the of Frauenberg near Budeweifs, where the French have a Garrison of 4 or 500 Men, is again invested by the Austrians, and in great Danger of being forced to surrender. The Corps of Hungarians in Upper Silesia daily increases, and they have lately taken a Prussian Lieutenant with 50 Men; and a Party of them has appeared near Neifs. It is written from Prague, that the Emperor was expected there the 28th of this Month, in order to be crown'd a few Days afterwards King of Bohemia: But from Francfort we hear, that his Imperial Majesty is again confin'd to his Bed by the Gout.

Ostend, May 21. On the 19th Instant, arrived here Major General Howard, Brigadier General Pulteney, Colonel Duroure, and Colonel Peers; and the Transports, with the English Regiments on board, came into the Harbour this Afternoon, but too late to land. Billanders are ordered to receive the Men on board To-morrow Morning, and to sail with them directly up to Bruges.

Whitehall, May 15.

His Majesty's Sloop the Hound, commanded by Captain Cooper, being on a Cruize in the Soundings, gave Chace to a Snow on the 29th of last Month, Eleven Leagues to the Westward of Ushant, and came up with her the next Morning, when she hoisted Spanish Colours, and after a short Engagement struck, and Captain Cooper has brought her into Plymouth. She was a Spanish Privateer, called the Nuestra Senora del Pilar, commanded by Maquel del Casal, and had 81 Men, and mounted eight Carriage and 14 Swivel Guns, all which, except five of the Swivels, were thrown over-board during the Chace. She came from Bilboa, and had been but 12 Days off the Stocks, and was intended to cruize in the Channel.
