MANIFESTO. Y the Grace of God, We Elifabeth, Emprefs and Sovereign of all the Ruffias, &c. make known by thefe Prefents to all and every one, but particularly to the States and Inhabitants of the Dutchy of Finland.

It cannot but be fufficiently known to all the Word, and even to those Swedish Subjects themfelves who are not abfolutely determined to admit of no found Reflexion, after what unjust Manner a War against the Russian Empire has been premeditated for some Years past on the Part of the Crown of Sweden, which at last broke out, and was actually begun. Recapitulations on this Subject would be for much the more superfluous, as the Progress of the War of it felf, and the Bleffings which the Almighty has vouch fafed to the Russian Arms, ever fince its first Beginning, have sufficiently manifested, that God never feconds unjust Attempts, but in Differences and Disputes unjustly begun, always affists the injured Party with his powerful Hand and Help.

At our Accellion to our Hereditary Paternal Thronc, being filled with a fincere Defire of living ut Peace and Friendship with our Neighbours, and of procuring to our Subjects, by ftrengthening the Tranquility of our Empire both at Home and Abroad, a flourishing State and lafting Welfare; as alfo at the fame time, out of that particular Good-will which we always bore to the neighbouring Kingdom of Sweden and its Subjects; we faw with no fmall Concern the Continuance of this War, and the Ruin and Bloodfhed thence accruing to the Subjects on both Sides, and confequently have not neglected, on our Part, any poffible Ways and Means we could employ, for putting an End to the Flame of War, and fuch useles Hostilities, as must difpleafe God Almighty, and for fettling, by the Re-eftablishment of Peace, the former neighbourly Friendship and publick Security upon a lasting and fure Foundation.

We have not been wanting in any Point to give the clearest Proofs of our fincere Intentions and ready Disposition ; we suspended for a confiderable Time the Operations of War, even in the Midst of the prosperous Progress of our Arms, and in vain waited four Months for fome Propofals of Peace expected on the Part of Sweden; mean time we caufed the Swedifh Subjects on all Occasions to meet with all Sort of friendly Ufage, and fincerely contributed, on our Part, to whatever was possible for promoting the Re-establishment of Peace, in Hopes that our peaceable Conduct would work in the Crown of Sweden a reciprocal good Disposition, and that confequently, by a mutual Concurrence, and fincere Refolution, the farther fpreading of fo ruinous an Evil, the Defolation of innocent Countries and Subjects, and all other Calamities attending a ; War, might be in Time prevented, and a Peace pleafing to the Almighty be brought to a happy Conclusion.

In this our favourable Difpofition we were the more confirmed, as we were not unacquainted, that this unjust War was begun, not at the general Defire and unanimous Confent of all the States and Subjects of the Kingdom of Sweden, but that no fmall Number of them had been of quite different Sentiments, who juftly reflecting on the dangerous and pernicious Confequences of a War, begun in an unjuft Manner, all along detefted the iniquitous Steps and Enterprizes of those Perfons, who did not fcruple to facrifice, in an unjustifiable Manner, the publick Weal of their Country to their own private Views and mercenary Paffions: And whereas the Inhabitants of the Dutchy of Finland may be naturally fuppofed to be of that Number, and have the greater Reafon for withing a speedy Determination of this War, as they and their Estates and Poffeffions were first exposed to the Calamities of it, and were forced, though innocent, to undergo fuch Ruin and Devastation : And whereas we, out of a Christian Compassion and Magnanimity, do take these their Sufferings to Heart, and fo much the rather, as in purfuance of our aforefaid peaceable Disposition, we are far from any Views of extending our Power, or making new Conquests, or ever defiring to obtain from Sweden the least Thing, except the Maintenance of Friendship and good Neighbourhood; For these Reasons, at a Time when, contrary to our Inclination, this ruinous War and Effusion of Blood must be carried on, seeing our well-meaning Dispolition for Peace has not yet been able to produce the wished-for Effect, but we have found our felves neceffitated to caufe our Forces anew to penetrate into Finland, we have found good and neceflary, by this our prefent Declaration and Manifesto, to make known to the States and Inhabitants of the Dutchy of Finland, our forefaid favourable Intentions, and that our Forces have not entred their Country with an Intent of taking Possession or making a Conquest of it; affuring all and every one of them in the strongest Manner, after having kindly represented to them their own Good and that of their Country, that if during this War they keep still and quiet, taking no Part in the military Operations or Enterprizes thereto belonging, nor fuffering themfelves to be employed in Hoftilities against us and our Forces, or in any Ways affifting the Swedifh Army, but rather by real Proofs teftifying their Intention of living with us in neighbourly Friendship and Peace; then on our Part, not only no Manner of Prejudice shall be offered to the faid States and Inhabitants, but every one shall be left quietly, and without any Vexation, in the full Enjoyment of his Estates and Postellions, and they shall in all Respects enjoy our Protection and Defence in relation thereto. But moreover, we will, according to our fincere Intentions of not appropriating to our felves the leaft Spot of Ground of another's Territories, very willingly confent, and in all ways whatfoever contribute to the faid Dutchy of Finland's remaining (if they intend to fhake off their Subjection to Sweden, to the End that they may not for
