From the General Quarters at Vilshoven in Bavaria, the 19th of May, 1742.

ON the 18th our Army marched from the Cloyster of Allerspatch to Villhoven, where the General Quarters are at present, and all the Regiments had Orders to encamp near Platling, the Right Wing being posted very near that City, and the Left extending itself as far as Osterhoven. At the same Time a Bridge of Boats was laid over the Danube, and a Party of Hussars and Warasdins were ordered to encamp on the other Side of that River. In the Afternoon Count Khevenhuller made a Tour to the Camp, and at the same Time reviewed the Troops which were put under Arms. Part of the Enemy's Army is at Platling and Part at Deckendorff on the other Side of the Danube; these last fire continually from their Cannon on our Camp, but without any Effect. The 20th two Regiments of Foot, which were at Passau, came to our Camp. The 21st the Enemy appeared more disposed to attack us than the Evening before; but having discovered some Thousands of our Hussars and Warasdins encamp'd not far from us, they immediately retired. The 22d our Hussars attack'd the Enemy's Van Guard, and drove them from their Posts; but a strong Detachment of the Enemy obliged them to retire. There are 6000 of the Enemy's Troops in the Castle of Grafenaw, about six Hours from Passau: They are entrenching themselves there, and it is said, they still expect other Troops, with which they design to besiege the Cittadel of Passau.

Vienna, May 26. There is no very certain Advices of the Prussians, the most probable Opinion is, that they are cantoned between Kutenberg and Kolin. Three Regiments of Prussian Cavalry have been ordered out of Upper Silesia, one of which, belonging to Margrave Frederick having been attacked by a Regiment of Hussars, near Ratibor, had above 200 killed and as many taken Prisoners, with 250 Horses, three Silver Trumpets and two Standards.

Copenhagen, June 2. The Court returned hither two Days ago, but leaves this Place again this Afternoon to settle at Hirschholm.

Dresden, June 3. We hear from Breslau, that the Hungarians grow stronger in Silesia, and have made a considerable Booty of Cattle, which the Prussians had bought in Poland. The King of Prussia remains in his Camp, and Prince Charles is making several Motions with his Army about Haber, but with what Design is not known.

Hambourg, June 5. M. Buys arrived last Night, to reside here on the Part of the States General. We hear from Moscow, that the same Honours which were shewn to Peter the Second when the Empress Catharine was crowned, have been observed with Regard to the young Duke of Holstein, at the Coronation of the present Empress.
